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ASSEMBLYMAN BRIAN CURRAN'S ETHICS REFORM PACKAGE INCLUDES:

- True pension forfeiture for all politicians convicted of felonies.
- The Public Officers Accountability Act (A.4617), dubbed the strongest anti-corruption legislation in the nation, that would:
 - Institute eight-year term limits for legislative leaders and committee chairs, including Speaker of the Assembly;
 - Require the return of campaign funds to donors or charity upon felony convictions;
 - Create a new crime for failure to report corruption;
 - Limit the use of campaign funds to campaign activities and prohibit use of those funds for criminal defense fees; and
 - Replace the Joint Commission on Public Ethics with a truly independent investigative panel.
- Saying 'NO' to any campaign welfare plan that will use taxpayer dollars to benefit politicians getting elected – that money should go to educate our children, programs and services for seniors, mandate relief, and/or property tax relief.
- Term limits for all elected officials.

Holding public office is an honor and a privilege. It's time we hold public officials accountable for their actions. The people of New York deserve better and should be able to trust the representatives they have sent to Albany to represent them.
