- Expand aggravated cruelty to animals to cover harm done to a companion animal during the course of a felony act. (A.3038B)



SUMMER SAFETY TIPS:

- If you cannot hold your own hand on the pavement for at least five seconds, it is too hot for your pet to walk on.
- Don't leave your pet locked in the car, even a few minutes with the windows cracked can be dangerous.
- Pets can get sunburn too, apply sunscreen to the most exposed areas such as stomachs, ears and noses. Don't shave your pet to help with the heat, their fur is meant to protect and keep them cool.
- Keep them hydrated. Heavy panting, dry or bright red gums, vomiting, thick drool, wobbly legs and diarrhea are all signs of overheating in animals.
