Small Business

Small businesses are the backbone of a local community. Over the past year I've met with business owners in the community and listened to their frustrations in dealing with bureaucracy. That's why I sponsored a new law along with my colleague, State Senator Leroy Comrie, to help small businesses receive certain abatements lost due to delays caused by the city. This means, for those exemptions, the business will no longer be penalized for actions out of their control.



Zombie Homes

During my first session last year I voted for legislation to help address foreclosed homes that banks have not restored. The zombie homes have created a nuisance and public safety hazard for neighborhoods throughout Southeast Queens. We are now working with the Governor's office and the New York State Department of Financial Services, which oversees financial and banking institutions, to hold them accountable for these problematic properties. My office has received several locations from civic groups and community residents but we know more properties haven't yet been reported. Please call my office to ensure we have these properties in the database. Together we can hold the banks accountable for their actions.

Constituent Stories



Earlier this year, the guardian of an incapacitated senior reached out to my office regarding a fine of over \$37,000 given to the senior by the NYS Workers' Compensation Board. Unfortunately, through no fault of her own, she was taken advantage of by members of her family. My office stepped in and we were able to reduce the fine from \$37,701.50 to just \$1,125.00, allowing her to continue to receive the care she needed without the unnecessary and unfair penalty.



HEAP/Home Share

If you are need of heating assistance please contact my office to see if you qualify for number of state and local programs available during these frigid winter months.

Unclaimed Funds

My office, in partnership with New York State Comptroller Thomas DiNapoli, has held several "Get Your Money Back" events, in which constituents discovered if New York State owes them a check for unclaimed funds. Career and Technical Education (CTE)

The governor signed my Career and Technical Education bill, which I co-sponsored with State Senator Simcha Felder. This bill directs chancellors to study and make recommendations concerning the feasibility of expanding the number and types of career and technical education schools and programs. This will help to ensure our students are given every path to a meaningful education and help address the disparities black communities face in growing industries such as the technology sector.

To expose our children to future careers in technology, I hosted an engineering day at my alma mater SUNY New Paltz with students from our local high schools. This program introduced high school juniors to the world of engineering and more importantly students met with admissions counselors to chart a path to a college education.
