



Dear Friends,

The legislative session is in full swing! We are back in Albany this year, albeit with strict safety protocols, and I could not be more pleased.

**The budget season was launched last week with Governor Hochul's proposed \$218 billion Executive Budget.** The Assembly has scheduled [joint budget hearings](#) with the State Senate, which will lead up to the creation of a "One House" budget representing the collective views of both chambers. I am heartened that the Governor's budget provides a very good starting point, including:

- **\$31.3 billion in school aid**, which represents the highest level ever provided and follows through on the commitment to fully fund Foundation Aid. There is also increased funding for our state higher education institutions.
- **Tax relief with an acceleration of the middle-class tax cut**, which first began in 2018 and had been scheduled for completion in 2025. This accelerates the cuts so that they are completed in 2023, providing reduced rates to 6.1 million New Yorkers. Also included are tax credits for small businesses (including for those hit by COVID) and a homeowner tax rebate credit.
- An increase from \$3 billion to \$4 billion for the **Clean Water, Clean Air and Green Jobs Bond Act**, a \$500 million **investment in offshore wind**, and significant **new funding for the Environmental Protection Fund**.
- As a member of the Assembly Housing Committee, together with my colleagues, I advocated that the Governor launch a new Five-Year Capital Plan for affordable housing. The budget includes such a plan, with **\$26 billion toward the creation of 100,000 new affordable housing units, including 10,000 with support services for vulnerable populations**.
- As a member of the Committee on People with Disabilities, I was pleased to see a **43% funding increase for the Office for People With Developmental Disabilities (OPWDD)**, which will enable the agency to carry out its mission much more effectively.
- **Substantial funding increases for the NYS Department of Transportation, and to municipalities for their local roads.**
- **Increased resources to help local law enforcement combat gun violence.**
- **Increased health care funding**, including funding for health care and mental hygiene worker retention bonuses.

The Westchester delegation will be holding a virtual public forum on the budget next Thursday, February 3, from 10 am-2 pm. 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### **Free Rapid COVID-19 Tests Available**

**Four FREE at-home rapid antigen COVID-19 tests are now available from the federal government.** Limit of one set (of four) per household. Orders will usually ship in 7-12 days, and shipping is free via the U.S. Postal Service. If you haven't yet done so, go to [COVIDtests.gov](#) for more information and to order your test kit!

Additionally, insurance companies and group health plans must now cover the cost of eight over-the-counter at-home COVID-19 tests per person each month. Getting tested when necessary is crucial to protect yourself and others. [Click here](#) for more info.



On a related note, recently my office was able to distribute at-home COVID-19 tests and KN95 masks to organizations that desperately needed them. We delivered them to Lifting Up Westchester, Hope's Door, the YWCA White Plains & Central Westchester, the Thomas H. Slater Community Center, and the Mount Kisco Child Care Center, and we joined with State Senator Shelley Mayer's office in delivering them to The LOFT LGBT Community Center, the Community Center of Northern Westchester, and Westchester Jewish Community Services.

These are all organizations that help the people of our district with food, services, child care, and housing. **We are grateful to them all and are glad that we were able to aid them in their work for the community.**



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## **Property Tax Circuit Breaker Takes Effect**

You may recall that [last year](#) I reported that the budget adopted for 2021-22 included a property tax circuit breaker program. It has now gone into effect. **The new property tax circuit breaker program will help save middle class taxpayers more than \$400 million dollars.** To qualify for this new program, which will save homeowners up to \$350 per year, an individual must have resided at their current address for at least six months, earn less than \$250,000, be enrolled in or qualify for the STAR program, and spend more than 6% of their income on property taxes. The credit will be available when you file your 2021 taxes.

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## **Reminder! NYS Homeowner Assistance Fund Now Accepting Applications**

Are you a homeowner struggling due to the financial hardship caused by the pandemic? **A reminder that homeowners who are at risk of default, foreclosure, or displacement, including those living in condos and co-ops, can now apply for essential financial relief.** The NYS Homeowners Assistance Fund (NYS HAF) offers a wide range of services for eligible homeowners, such as financial support to address missed housing-related payments.

**IMPORTANT:** Applications will be processed in the order in which they are received. **As the program is expected to receive significantly more applications than can be funded by the program, I would encourage you to apply as soon as possible.**

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## **Pandemic-Related Accommodations - Recent Updates**

The legislature recently passed, and the governor signed, two pandemic-related accommodations that will allow citizens to feel they can safely vote and participate in local government meetings.

- **Absentee voting due to COVID-19 will be allowed through 2022.** The previous legislation that allowed for this expired in December. With the passage of this [new legislation](#), anyone who is concerned about voting in-person due to the risk caused by COVID can vote absentee under the temporary illness exception.
