
I hope this letter finds you and your family doing well. I'd like to share with you an update on the work we've been doing over the last six months.

Legislative Update & Looking Ahead

During the 2023 legislative session, I passed 15 bills through the state Assembly with bipartisan support — 12 of these have been signed into law. This past year, I have met with dozens of constituents, talking with them about the issues that matter most to them. As we head into the 2024 Legislative Session, I will be working with my colleagues to address these issues.

In addition to A. 5373, which focuses on the shortage of dental care in Upstate New York, I will also be introducing bills that provide an alternative to the 1-year residency requirement for dentists, establish an oral health public awareness campaign and help lower the cost of dental care in New York.

Over the summer and fall, I hosted several bullying prevention listening sessions, where I heard from students, teachers and school officials about their experiences. We will continue to reach out to parents, students, and teachers and use what we learn to help ensure every child can attend school without the fear of being bullied or harassed.

Supporting Seniors

This past August, I welcomed Assembly Speaker Carl Heastie to Glens Falls. Together, we paid a visit to the Glens Falls Senior Center, where we met with local seniors and discussed the issues affecting them most. We were also excited to announce \$620,000 in funding for the center, including \$500,000 to upgrade their basement elevator, outdoor ramp and indoor chair lift to make them compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act, as well as to update the center's windows and van.

This funding also includes \$100,000 for new equipment for the senior center, such as wood workshop tools, and \$20,000 for a new speaker system. It's always a pleasure to welcome the Speaker to our 113th District community, and I look forward to his next visit.



Libraries

As chair of the Assembly's Libraries and Education Technology Committee, I've spent this past year looking for new ways for the state Legislature to continue supporting our local libraries. This past October, I chaired a public hearing on how the state Legislature can more effectively utilize its library construction aid funding. What we learned in this hearing will help inform next year's budget. Locally, I was excited to attend the grand opening of Schuylerville Library's new pavilion. This "Schuylervilion" was constructed with funds provided in the 2020 Library Construction Aid Budget.

Supporting Our Veterans

Saratoga County is home to thousands of active-duty military including sailors and Navy officers. One of these active-duty sailors who lives in Saratoga Springs made me aware of a change in the military's tour discharge paperwork that affected their eligibility for the Veteran's Property Tax Exemption. I developed a bill (Chapter 611 of 2023) incorporating active-duty military personnel into our state's veteran's property tax exemption law, which the Governor recently signed. Veterans represent the very best of us and I will continue to encourage them to make New York their home.



Transportation

During the 2023 session, I passed a bill allowing the Capital District Transportation Authority to merge with Greater Glens Falls Transit (Ch. 411 of 2023). This merger will expand the CDTA to Warren County, providing residents and employers access to the Authority's large array of mobility services and future expansions. Combining the resources of these organizations will create new opportunities, encourage economic development and innovation and forge stronger connections between Saratoga Springs, Glens Falls, Lake George and the Greater Capital Region.

This past summer, the CDTA also announced a reconfiguration of the FLEX Service, which will now include a stretch along the Hudson River from Stillwater to Mechanicville.
