AN ACT making appropriations for the support of government

AID TO LOCALITIES BUDGET

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

1 Section 1. a) The several amounts specified in this chapter for aid to
2 localities, or so much thereof as shall be sufficient to accomplish the
3 purposes designated by the appropriations, are hereby appropriated and
4 authorized to be paid as hereinafter provided, to the respective public
5 officers and for the several purposes specified.

6 b) Where applicable, appropriations made by this chapter for expendi-
7 tures from federal grants for aid to localities may be allocated for
8 spending from federal grants for any grant period beginning, during, or
9 prior to, the state fiscal year beginning on April 1, 2020 except as
10 otherwise noted.

11 c) The several amounts named herein, or so much thereof as shall be
12 sufficient to accomplish the purpose designated, being the undisbursed
13 and/or unexpended balances of the prior year's appropriations, are here-
14 by reappropriated from the same funds and made available for the same
15 purposes as the prior year's appropriations, unless herein amended, for
16 the fiscal year beginning April 1, 2020. Certain reappropriations in
17 this chapter are shown using abbreviated text, with three leader dots
18 (an ellipsis) followed by three spaces (...) used to indicate where
19 existing law that is being continued is not shown. However, unless a
20 change is clearly indicated by the use of brackets [] for deletions and
21 underscores for additions, the purposes, amounts, funding source and all
22 other aspects pertinent to each item of appropriation shall be as last
23 appropriated.

24 For the purpose of complying with the state finance law, the year,
25 chapter and section of the last act reappropriating a former original
26 appropriation or any part thereof is, unless otherwise indicated, chap-
27 ter 53, section 1, of the laws of 2019.

28 d) No moneys appropriated by this chapter shall be available for
29 payment until a certificate of approval has been issued by the director
30 of the budget, who shall file such certificate with the department of
31 audit and control, the chairperson of the senate finance committee and
32 the chairperson of the assembly ways and means committee.

33 e) Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, if the finan-
34 cial plan required under sections twenty-two or twenty-three of the
35 state finance law estimates that the general fund is reasonably antic-
36 ipated to end the fiscal year with an imbalance of \$500,000,000 or more,

1 the director of the division of the budget shall prepare a plan that
2 shall be submitted to the legislature, which shall identify the general
3 fund and state special revenue fund appropriations contained herein and
4 related disbursements that may be reduced to eliminate the imbalance
5 identified in the general fund, provided, however, that the total
6 reduction in disbursements identified in such plan shall not exceed an
7 amount equal to 1.0 percent of estimated disbursements in total state
8 operating funds for fiscal year 2020-2021. The legislature shall have 30
9 days after such submission to either prepare its own plan, which may be
10 adopted by concurrent resolution passed by both houses and implemented
11 by the division of the budget, or if after 30 days the legislature fails
12 to adopt its own plan, the reductions to the general fund and state
13 special revenue fund appropriations contained herein and related
14 disbursements identified in the division of the budget plan will go into
15 effect automatically. To the extent the state is obligated to make
16 payment to any individual or entity pursuant to any appropriation
17 contained herein to which an adjustment or reduction is applied in
18 accordance with this section, such obligation shall be reduced commensu-
19 rate with any adjustments or reductions made by the director of the
20 budget and/or by the legislature. The following types of appropriations
21 shall be exempt from reduction in any plan prepared by the budget direc-
22 tor and/or any plan adopted by the legislature: (a) public assistance
23 payments for families and individuals and payments for eligible aged,
24 blind and disabled persons related to supplemental social security; (b)
25 any reductions that would violate federal law; (c) payments of debt
26 service and related expenses for which the state is constitutionally
27 obligated to pay debt service or is contractually obligated to pay debt
28 service, subject to an appropriation, including where the state has a
29 contingent contractual obligation; and (d) payments the state is obli-
30 gated to make pursuant to court orders or judgments.

31 f) Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, for purposes
32 of any appropriation made by this chapter which authorizes spending in
33 an amount net of refunds, rebates, reimbursements, credits, repayments,
34 and/or disallowances, "refunds" shall mean funds received to the state
35 resulting from the overpayment of monies, "rebates" shall mean funds
36 received to the state resulting from a return of a full or partial
37 amount previously paid, as for goods or services, serving as a
38 reduction, discount or rebate to the original payment amount,
39 "reimbursements" shall mean funds received to the state as repayment in
40 an equivalent amount for goods or services, including but not limited to
41 personal service costs, incurred by the state in the first instance
42 being provided to a third party for their benefit and partially or in
43 full financed by such third party, "credit" shall mean monies made
44 available to the state that reduce the amount owed to a third party,
45 including but not limited to billing errors, rebates, and prior
46 overpayments, "repayment" shall mean the return of monies as pay back
47 for expenses incurred, and "disallowance" shall mean monies made
48 available to the state that were not allowed or accepted officially by
49 the intended recipient, based on a determination the payment is not
50 acceptable and/or valid. When the office of the state comptroller
51 receives any such refunds, rebates, reimbursements, credits, repayments,
52 and/or disallowances, he or she shall credit the refunded, rebated,
53 reimbursed, credited, repaid, and disallowed amount back to the original
54 appropriation and reduce expenditures in the year which such credit is
55 received regardless of the timing of the initial expenditure.

56 g) Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, if the
57 state or any agency thereof incurs any costs associated with
58 administering the rent regulation program in accordance with subdivision
59 (c) of section 8 of chapter 576 of the laws of 1974, as amended, for a
60 city having a population of one million or more, the director of the
61 budget may direct any other state agency or agencies making payments to
62 such city, or any department, agency, or instrumentality thereof, to
63 permanently reduce the amount of any other payment or payments owed to
64 such city or any department, agency, or instrumentality thereof pursuant

1 to any appropriation set forth in this chapter. Provided however, that
2 such reduction shall be in an amount equal to the costs incurred by the
3 state or agency thereof in accordance with subdivision (c) of section 8
4 of chapter 576 of the laws of 1974 and provided further that such
5 direction shall be made in writing by the director of the budget. If the
6 director of the budget makes such direction pursuant to the authority
7 set forth herein, the impacted city shall not make the payments required
8 by subdivision (c) of section 8 of chapter 576 of the laws of 1974, as
9 amended, and the division of housing and community renewal shall notify
10 such city in writing of what payment or payments will be reduced and the
11 amount of such reduction. To the extent a city of one million or more or
12 any department, agency, or instrumentality thereof is entitled to any
13 cash disbursement authorized by any appropriation contained in this
14 chapter, such entitlement shall be reduced commensurate with reductions
15 in payments made in accordance with this part.

16 h) Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, upon
17 enactment of this chapter of the laws of 2020 containing the aid to
18 localities budget bill for the state fiscal year 2020-2021,
19 all appropriations and reappropriations contained in chapter 53 of the
20 laws of 2019, which would otherwise lapse by operation of law on March
21 31, 2021 are hereby repealed.

22 i) The appropriations contained in this chapter shall be available for
23 the fiscal year beginning on April 1, 2020 except as otherwise noted.

15 commissioner, who shall consult with appropriate state organizations
16 representing K-12 public school teachers and approved by the direc-
17 tor of the budget, to build a corps of outstanding teachers in order
18 to improve the quality of instruction at public secondary schools.
19 Such plan for use of funding appropriated herein shall: (i) allocate
20 at least 80 percent of such stipends to high-performing teachers in
21 math, science and related fields and up to 20 percent of such
22 stipends to high performing teachers with an extension to their
23 content area certificate in bilingual education or who hold certif-
24 ication in English as a Second Language and high-performing teachers
25 with dual certification in a content area and special education;
26 (ii) establish an application process; (iii) guidelines by which

31 successful applicants. Provided, further, that priority shall be
32 given to applicants in regions of the state where a similar program
33 is not otherwise offered. Notwithstanding any provision of law to
34 the contrary, upon approval of the director of the budget, such
35 \$2,500,000 of master teachers program funding may be suballocated,
36 interchanged, transferred or otherwise made available to the state
37 university of New York for the services and expenses of administer-
38 ing such program. Nothing herein shall be construed to limit the
39 rights of labor organizations representing teachers to collectively
40 bargain terms and conditions pursuant to article 14 of the civil
41 service law.

42 Provided further that, notwithstanding any provision of law to the
43 contrary, the \$1,500,000 appropriated herein available for pathways
44 in technology early college high school (P-TECH) program grants
45 shall be awarded pursuant to a plan developed by the commissioner
46 and approved by the director of the budget, provided that such plan
47 shall include but not be limited to (i) assurances that K-12, higher
48 education and private-sector partners commit to the required
49 elements and responsibilities of a P-TECH program, (ii) provisions
50 to ensure regional diversity of grant recipients, and (iii) priority

52 school districts; provided further that the commissioner shall make
53 available the request for proposals for such program on or before
54 May fifteenth and the commissioner shall issue awards on or before

60 connection with such guidelines, the commissioner shall execute a
61 memorandum of understanding with the state university of New York
62 and the city university of New York to develop common data

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1 collection, sharing and reporting mechanisms based on student-level
2 data for students enrolled in P-TECH and smart scholars early
3 college high school programs. Provided further that, notwithstanding
4 any provision of law to the contrary, higher education partners
5 participating in a P-TECH program, or the entity/entities responsi-
6 ble for setting tuition at the institution, shall be authorized to
7 set a reduced rate of tuition and/or fees, or to waive tuition
8 and/or fees entirely, for students enrolled in such P-TECH program
9 with no reduction in other state, local or other support for such
10 students earning college credit that such higher education partner
11 would otherwise be eligible to receive.

12 Provided, further, that notwithstanding any provision of law to the
13 contrary, the \$1,500,000 appropriated herein available for a school
14 district teacher residency program shall be used to provide resident
15 teachers with the professional development and training to make an
16 immediate impact in schools in the state, pursuant to a plan devel-
17 oped by the commissioner and approved by the director of the budget.
18 Provided, further, that such plan shall establish a process for
19 selection of experienced nonprofit entities to manage the program.

29 education leading to a career as a teacher in public elementary or
30 secondary education shall be eligible for an award, provided the
31 applicant: (a) earned an undergraduate degree from a college located
32 in New York state; and (b) was a New York State resident while earn-
33 ing such undergraduate degree; and (c) achieved academic excellence
34 as an undergraduate student, as defined by the higher education
35 services corporation in regulation; and (d) enrolls in full-time
36 study in an approved master's degree in education program at a New
37 York State public institution of higher education leading to a
38 career as teacher in public elementary or secondary education; and
39 (e) signs a contract with the corporation agreeing to teach in the
40 classroom on a full-time basis for five years in a school located
41 within New York state providing public elementary or secondary
42 education recognized by the board of regents or the university of
43 the state of New York including charter schools authorized pursuant
44 to article 56 of the education law; and (f) complies with the appli-
45 cable provisions of article 13 of education law and all requirements
46 promulgated by the corporation for the administration of the
47 program. Provided, further, that: (a) awards shall be granted to
48 applicants that the corporation has certified are eligible to
49 receive such awards; and (b) up to five hundred awards may be made
50 for the 2015-2016 academic year, provided such awards shall be made
51 to recipients after the successful completion of the term, as
52 defined by the corporation. Provided, further, the corporation shall
53 grant such awards in an amount equal to the annual tuition charged
54 state resident students attending a graduate program full-time at
55 the state university of New York, or actual tuition charged, which-
56 ever is less, for not more than two academic years of full-time
57 graduate study leading to certification as an elementary or second-
58 ary classroom teacher; provided: (i) a student who receives educa-
59 tional grants and/or scholarships that cover the student's full cost
60 of attendance shall not be eligible for an award under this program;
61 (ii) for a student who receives educational grants and/or scholar-
62 ships that cover less than the student's full cost of attendance,

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1 such grants and/or scholarships shall not be deemed duplicative of

19 be determined by the corporation if: (a) two years after the
20 completion of the degree program and receipt of initial certif-
21 ication it is found that a recipient is not teaching in a public
22 school located within New York state providing elementary or second-
23 ary education recognized by the board of regents or the university
24 of the state of New York including charter schools authorized pursu-
25 ant to article 56 of the education law; or (b) a recipient has not
26 taught in a public school located within New York state providing
27 elementary or secondary education recognized by the board of regents

37 preceding terms and conditions: (a) shall be deferred for any inter-
38 ruption in graduate study or employment as established by the rules
39 and regulations of the corporation; (b) shall be cancelled upon the
40 death of the recipient; and (c) notwithstanding any provision of
41 this appropriation to the contrary, authorize the corporation to
42 provide for the waiver or suspension of any financial obligation
43 which would involve extreme hardship pursuant to rules and regu-
44 lations promulgated by the corporation. Notwithstanding any
45 provision of the law to the contrary, upon approval of the director
46 of the budget, such \$1,500,000 of masters-in-education teacher
47 incentive scholarship program funding may be sub-allocated, inter-
48 changed, transferred or otherwise made available to the higher
49 education services corporation for the sole purpose of administering
50 such program.

51 Provided, further, that notwithstanding any provision of law to the
52 contrary, the \$1,500,000 appropriated herein available for QUALITYs-
53 tarsNY shall be used, pursuant to a plan approved by the director of
54 the budget, to support implementation of a statewide system to
55 assess, improve, and communicate the level of quality in early
56 education and care settings throughout the state. Notwithstanding
57 any provision of law to the contrary, upon approval of the director
58 of the budget, the \$1,500,000 of funding appropriated herein for
59 QUALITYstarsNY may be suballocated, interchanged, transferred or
60 otherwise made available to the office of children and family
61 services for the sole purpose of administering such system.
62

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1 Provided further that, notwithstanding any provision of law to the
2 contrary, of the amount appropriated herein, a minimum of
3 \$14,000,000 per year shall be available in the 2016-17 through
4 [2019-20] 2020-21 school years for the payment of grant awards as
5 follows: \$11,000,000 for pre-kindergarten grants for three-year-old
6 children, \$1,500,000 for early college high school programs,
7 \$500,000 for career and technical education programs, and \$1,000,000
8 for QUALITYstarsNY; provided, however, the funds appropriated herein
9 for early college high school programs shall only be available for
10 grants awarded for the 2017-18 school year and prior school years;
11 provided, however, the funds appropriated herein for QUALITYstarsNY
12 shall only be available for expenses for the 2018-19 school year and
13 prior school years; provided, however, the funds appropriated herein

16 provided further that, notwithstanding any provision of law to the
17 contrary, such \$14,000,000, plus any other amounts so designated in
18 other items of appropriation within the general fund local assist-
19 ance account office of pre-kindergarten through grade twelve educa-
20 tion program, shall constitute the competitive awards amount author-
21 ized for the 2016-17 school year.

22 Provided further that, notwithstanding any provision of law to the
23 contrary, the \$11,000,000 appropriated herein available for prekin-
24 dergarten grants to full-day and half-day prekindergarten programs
25 for three-year-old children shall be awarded, based on a request for
26 proposals developed by the commissioner and approved by the director
27 of the budget, to school districts to establish new full-day and
28 half-day prekindergarten placements for three-year-olds; provided
29 that such grants shall only be used to supplement, not supplant

60 that as a condition of eligibility for receipt of such funding, a

62 four-year-old children, or children who would otherwise be eligible

26 Provided further that, notwithstanding any provision of law to the
27 contrary, the \$1,500,000 appropriated herein available for early
28 college high school programs shall be awarded pursuant to a plan
29 developed by the commissioner and approved by the director of the
30 budget, provided that such plan shall ensure regional diversity of
31 grant recipients and prioritize programs serving students in academ-
32 ically challenged school districts; provided further that the
33 commissioner shall make available the request for proposals for such
34 programs on or before May fifteenth and the commissioner shall issue
35 awards on or before August fifteenth; and provided further that a
36 portion of the payments to early college high school programs
37 awarded funding from this appropriation shall be made on a sliding

 6 education and care settings throughout the state. Notwithstanding
 7 any provision of law to the contrary, upon approval of the director
 8 of the budget, the \$1,000,000 of funding appropriated herein for
 9 QUALITYstarsNY may be suballocated, interchanged, transferred or
 10 otherwise made available to the office of children and family
 11 services for the sole purpose of administering such system.

26 Funds appropriated herein shall be used to provide competitive grants

 30 demonstrate satisfactory progress, as determined by the commissioner,
 31 towards implementation of elements such as high quality student
 32 assessments; use of data to improve instruction and student performance

9 excess of the total actual grant expenditures incurred by the
10 district in the current school year as approved by the commissioner.
11 Provided, further, that as a condition of eligibility for receipt of

13 indicators within two years, including, but not limited to, valid
14 and reliable measures of environmental quality, the quality of
15 teacher-student interactions and child outcomes, and ensure that any
16 such assessment of child outcomes shall not be used to make high-
17 takes educational decisions for individual children. Provided,
18 further, that no school district shall receive more than forty
19 percent of the total pre-kindergarten grant allocation.

20 Provided, further, that notwithstanding any provision of law to the
21 contrary, the \$10,000,000 appropriated herein available for school-
22 wide extended learning grants shall be awarded to school districts
23 or school districts in collaboration with not-for-profit community-
24 based organizations based on responses to a request for proposals
25 for planning and implementation grants that is (i) developed by the
26 commissioner; (ii) approved by the director of the budget; and (iii)
27 issued by the commissioner. Provided, further, that such grants
28 shall be awarded based on factors including, but not limited to, the
29 following: (i) the school district's proposal to target the schools
30 and students with the greatest need, and (ii) proposal quality.

50 pursuant to paragraph t of subdivision 1 of section 3602 of the
51 education law, for the year prior to the base year, divided by (ii)
52 the district's public school district enrollment, pursuant to
53 subparagraph (2) of paragraph n of such subdivision, for the year
54 prior to the base year, multiplied by (B) 10 percent (0.10), multi-
55 plied by (C) the quotient of (i) the average of the national consumer
56 price indexes determined by the United States department of labor
57 for the 12-month period preceding January first of the base year,
58 divided by (ii) the average of the national consumer price indexes
59 determined by the United States department of labor for the 12-month
60 period preceding January first of the year two years prior to the
61 base year; provided, however, that in extraordinary cases the
62 commissioner may award a grant that exceeds the per pupil limit

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1 described above; provided further, however, that no district shall
2 receive a grant in excess of the total actual grant expenditures
3 incurred by the district in the current school year as approved by
4 the commissioner. Provided, further, that no school district shall
5 receive more than forty percent of the total school-wide extended
6 learning grant allocation.

7 Provided, further, that notwithstanding any provision of law to the
8 contrary, the \$7,500,000 appropriated herein available for community
9 schools grants shall be awarded, based on a request for proposals
10 (i) developed by the state council on children and families in coord-
11 ination with the commissioner, (ii) approved by the director of the
12 budget and (iii) issued by the commissioner, to school districts, or
13 in a city with a population of one million or more an eligible enti-
14 ty, to improve student outcomes through the implementation of commu-
15 nity schools programs that use school buildings as community hubs to
16 deliver co-located or school-linked academic, health, mental health,
17 nutrition, counseling, legal and/or other services to students and
18 their families. In a city with a population of one million or more,
19 eligible entities shall mean the city school district of the city of
20 New York, or not-for-profit organizations, which shall include not-
21 for-profit community-based organizations. An eligible entity that is
22 a not-for-profit may apply for a community school grant provided
23 that it collaborates with the city school district of the city of
24 New York and receives the approval of the chancellor of the city
25 school district of the city of New York. Provided, further, that
26 such grants shall be awarded based on factors including, but not
27 limited to, the following: (i) measures of school district need,
28 (ii) measures of the need of students to be served by each of the
29 school districts, (iii) the school district's proposal to target the
30 highest need schools and students, (iv) the sustainability of the
31 proposed community schools program, and (v) proposal quality.
32 Provided, further, that to assess proposal quality in order to award
33 such funding, the commissioner shall take into account factors
34 including, but not limited to: (i) the extent to which the school
35 district's proposal would provide such community services through
36 partnerships with local governments and non-profit organizations,
37 (ii) the extent to which the proposal would provide for delivery of
38 such services directly in school buildings, (iii) the extent to
39 which the proposal articulates how such services would facilitate
40 measurable improvement in student and family outcomes, (iv) the
41 extent to which the proposal articulates and identifies how existing
42 funding streams and programs would be used to provide such community
43 services, and (v) the extent to which the proposal ensures the safe-
44 ty of all students, staff and community members in school buildings
45 used as community hubs. Provided, however, that community schools
46 grants appropriated herein shall be paid to school districts in
47 installments upon successful implementation of each phase of a
48 school district's approved proposal. Provided, further, that no
49 school district shall receive more than forty percent of the total
50 community schools grant allocation, and that each individual commu-
51 nity school site shall be limited to a maximum grant of \$500,000.

52 Provided, further, that notwithstanding any provision of law to the
53 contrary, the \$5,500,000 appropriated herein available for a master
54 teachers program shall support the award of stipends of \$15,000 per
55 annum over four years to individual high-performing teachers in
56 math, science and related fields, and of related costs, administered
57 by the state university of New York pursuant to a plan developed in
58 consultation with the commissioner, who shall consult with appropri-
59 ate state organizations representing K-12 public school teachers,
60 and approved by the director of the budget, to build a corps of
61 outstanding math, science and related fields teachers in order to
62 improve the quality of instruction at public secondary schools.

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1 Such plan for use of funding appropriated herein shall: (i) estab-
2 lish an application process; (ii) guidelines by which applications
3 from eligible teachers shall be evaluated, which shall include, but
4 not be limited to, achievement of a rating of highly effective on
5 the annual professional performance review; and (iii) provide peri-
6 odic opportunities for professional development for successful
7 applicants. Provided, further, that priority shall be given to
8 applicants in regions of the state where a similar program is not
9 otherwise offered. Notwithstanding any provision of law to the
10 contrary, upon approval of the director of the budget, such
11 \$5,500,000 of master teachers program funding may be sub-allocated,
12 interchanged, transferred or otherwise made available to the state
13 university of New York for the services and expenses of administer-
14 ing such program. Nothing herein shall be construed to limit the
15 rights of labor organizations to collectively bargain terms and
16 conditions pursuant to article 14 of the civil service law.

17 Provided, further, that notwithstanding any provision of law to the
18 contrary, the \$2,000,000 appropriated herein available for the early
19 college high school program shall support the continuation and
20 expansion of such program pursuant to a plan developed by the
21 commissioner and approved by the director of the budget. Provided,
22 however, that a portion of the payments to early college high school
23 programs awarded funding from this appropriation shall be awarded on
24 a sliding scale based upon the number of college credits earned
25 annually by participating students, consistent with guidelines
26 established by the commissioner. Provided further that, notwith-
27 standing any provision of law to the contrary, higher education
28 partners participating in an early college high schools program, or
29 the entity/entities responsible for setting tuition at the institu-
30 tion, shall be authorized to set a reduced rate of tuition and/or
31 fees, or to waive tuition and/or fees entirely, for students
32 enrolled in such early college high schools program with no
33 reduction in other state, local or other support for such students
34 earning college credit that such higher education partner would
35 otherwise be eligible to receive.

36 Provided further that, notwithstanding any provision of law to the
37 contrary, of the amount appropriated herein, a minimum of
38 \$12,500,000 per year shall be available in the 2014-15 through
39 2019-20 school years for the payment of grant awards as follows:
40 \$2,500,000 of pathways in technology early college high school
41 program grants and \$10,000,000 of teacher excellence fund grants;
42 provided, however, the funds appropriated herein for pathways in
43 technology early college high school program grants shall only be
44 available for grants awarded for the 2017-18 school year and prior
45 school years; provided further that, notwithstanding any provision
46 of law to the contrary, such \$12,500,000, plus any other amounts so
47 designated in other items of appropriation within the general fund
48 local assistance account office of pre-kindergarten through grade
49 twelve education program, shall constitute the competitive awards
50 amount authorized for the 2013-14 school year by chapter 53 of the
51 laws of 2013.

52 Provided further that, notwithstanding any provision of law to the
53 contrary, the \$2,500,000 appropriated herein available for pathways
54 in technology early college high school (P-TECH) program grants
55 shall be awarded pursuant to a plan developed by the commissioner
56 and approved by the director of the budget, provided that such plan
57 shall include but not be limited to (i) assurances that K-12, higher
58 education and private-sector partners commit to the required
59 elements and responsibilities of a P-TECH program, (ii) provisions
60 to ensure regional diversity of grant recipients, and (iii) priority
61 for P-TECH programs serving students in academically challenged
62 school districts; provided further that the commissioner shall make

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1 available the request for proposals for such program on or before
2 May fifteenth and the commissioner shall issue awards on or before
3 August fifteenth; and provided further that a portion of the
4 payments to P-TECH programs awarded funding from this appropriation
5 shall be made on a sliding scale based upon the number of college
6 credits earned annually by participating students, consistent with
7 guidelines established by the commissioner. Provided further that,
8 notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, higher educa-
9 tion partners participating in a P-TECH program, or the
10 entity/entities responsible for setting tuition at the institution,
11 shall be authorized to set a reduced rate of tuition and/or fees, or
12 to waive tuition and/or fees entirely, for students enrolled in such
13 P-TECH program with no reduction in other state, local or other
14 support for such students earning college credit that such higher
15 education partner would otherwise be eligible to receive.

16 Provided further that, notwithstanding any provision of law to the
17 contrary, the \$10,000,000 appropriated herein available for teacher
18 excellence fund grants shall be awarded to eligible school districts
19 pursuant to a request for proposals based on a plan developed by the
20 commissioner and approved by the director of the budget; provided
21 that such plan shall include an application for award of such grants
22 to such eligible school districts to provide annual teacher excel-
23 lence fund performance awards of up to \$20,000 to eligible teachers
24 rated as "highly effective" on the most recent annual professional
25 performance review, in accordance with the requirements of section
26 3012-d of the education law and the regulations of the commissioner,
27 pursuant to such districts' approved applications; provided that in
28 making such grants the commissioner shall prioritize school
29 districts' applications based on factors including but not limited
30 to (i) the extent to which the school district's application would
31 recognize and reward such teachers in school buildings with the
32 greatest academic need, in difficult-to-staff subject or certifi-
33 cation areas and grade levels, and at critical points in a teach-
34 er's career in order to encourage highly effective teachers to
35 remain in the classroom, and (ii) the quality of the school
36 district's application; and provided further that the commissioner
37 shall make available the application for such grants on or before
38 May fifteenth and the commissioner shall issue grant awards an
39 agreed-to schedule.

40 Provided further that, notwithstanding any provision of law to the
41 contrary, of the amount appropriated herein, a minimum of
42 \$23,500,000 per year shall be available in the 2015-16 through
43 [2019-20] 2020-21 school years for the payment of grant awards as
44 follows: \$15,000,000 for pre-kindergarten grants, \$2,500,000 for an
45 expanded master teacher program, \$1,500,000 of pathways in
46 technology early college high school program grants, \$1,500,000 for
47 a school district teacher residency program, \$1,500,000 for a New
48 York state masters-in-education teacher incentive scholarship
49 program, and \$1,500,000 for QUALITYstarsNY; provided, however, the
50 funds appropriated herein for pathways in technology early college
51 high school program grants shall only be available for grants
52 awarded for the 2017-18 school year and prior school years;
53 provided, however, the funds appropriated herein for the expanded
54 master teacher program shall only be available for expenses for the
55 2018-19 school year and prior school years; provided, however, the
56 funds appropriated herein for QUALITYstarsNY shall only be available
57 for expenses for the 2018-19 school year and prior school years;
58 provided, however, the funds appropriated herein for the New York
59 state master-in-education teacher incentive scholarship program
60 shall only be available for expenses for the 2018-19 school year and
61 prior school years; provided further that, notwithstanding any
62 provision of law to the contrary, such \$23,500,000, plus any other

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1 amounts so designated in other items of appropriation within the
2 general fund local assistance account office of pre-kindergarten
3 through grade twelve education program, shall constitute the
4 competitive awards amount authorized for the 2015-16 school year.
5 Provided, further, that notwithstanding any provision of law to the
6 contrary, the \$15,000,000 appropriated herein available for grants
7 to full-day and half-day pre-kindergarten programs for three-year-
8 old and four-year-old children shall be awarded, based on a request
9 for proposals developed by the commissioner and approved by the
10 director of the budget, to school districts to establish new full-
11 day and half-day pre-kindergarten placements for three-year-olds and
12 four-year-olds; provided that such grants shall only be used to
13 supplement, not supplant existing pre-kindergarten programs; and
14 provided further, however, that any portion of such \$15,000,000 that
15 is not awarded shall remain available for subsequent awards in the
16 2015-16 school year or for full-day and half-day prekindergarten
17 grants to be awarded in subsequent school years. Provided, further,
18 that such grants from funds appropriated herein shall be awarded
19 based on factors including, but not limited to, the following: (i)
20 measures of school district need, (ii) measures of the need of
21 students to be served by each of the school districts, (iii) the
22 school district's proposal to target the highest need schools and
23 students, (iv) the extent to which the district's proposal would
24 prioritize funds to maximize the total number of eligible children
25 in the district served in pre-kindergarten programs, and (v)
26 proposal quality. Provided, however, that full-day and half-day
27 pre-kindergarten grants appropriated herein shall only be available
28 to support programs (i) that provide instruction for at least five
29 hours per school day for full-day pre-kindergarten programs and at
30 least two and one-half hours per school day for half-day prekin-
31 dergarten programs; (ii) that agree to offer instruction consistent
32 with the New York state pre-kindergarten foundation for the common
33 core standards; (iii) that ensure that, to the extent community-
34 based providers are part of such program, such providers meet the
35 requirements of paragraphs d-1 and d-2 of subdivision 12 of section
36 3602-e of the education law; and (iv) that otherwise comply with all
37 of the same rules and requirements as universal prekindergarten
38 programs pursuant to section 3602-e of the education law except as
39 modified herein; provided that notwithstanding paragraph c of subdivi-
40 sion 1 of section 3602-e of the education law notwithstanding, for
41 the purposes of this appropriation, an eligible child shall be a
42 resident child who is three years of age on or before December first
43 of the year in which he or she is enrolled. Provided, further, that
44 as a condition of eligibility for receipt of such funding for three-
45 year-olds, a school district must currently offer a prekindergarten
46 program for four-year-old children, or children who would otherwise
47 be eligible under paragraph c of subdivision 1 of section 3602-e of
48 the education law; provided, further, that a school district may
49 apply for only as many full-day or half-day placements for three-
50 year-old children as it currently offers for four-year-old children,
51 or children who would otherwise be eligible under paragraph c of
52 subdivision 1 of section 3602-e of the education law. Provided,
53 further, that a school district's grant for three-year-old and four-
54 year-old pre-kindergarten shall equal the product of (A) (i) two
55 multiplied by the approved number of new full-day prekindergarten
56 placements plus (ii) the approved number of new half-day prekin-
57 dergarten placements, and (B) the district's selected aid per prekin-
58 dergarten pupil pursuant to subparagraph i of paragraph b of subdivi-
59 sion 10 of section 3602-e of the education law; provided, however,
60 that no district shall receive a grant in excess of the total actual
61 grant expenditures incurred by the district in the current school
62 year as approved by the commissioner. Provided, further, that as a

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1 condition of eligibility for receipt of such funding, a school
2 district shall agree to adopt approved quality indicators within two
3 years, including, but not limited to, valid and reliable measures of
4 environmental quality, the quality of teacher-student interactions
5 and child outcomes, and ensure that any such assessment of child
6 outcomes shall not be used to make high-stakes educational decisions
7 for individual children. Provided, further, that no school district
8 shall receive more than forty percent of the total prekindergarten
9 for three-year-old and four-year-old children grant allocation.

10 Provided, further, that notwithstanding any provision of law to the
11 contrary, the \$2,500,000 appropriated herein available for an
12 expanded master teachers program shall support the award of stipends
13 of \$15,000 per annum over four years to individual high-performing
14 teachers, and of related costs, administered by the state university
15 of New York pursuant to a plan developed in consultation with the
16 commissioner, who shall consult with appropriate state organizations
17 representing K-12 public school teachers and approved by the direc-
18 tor of the budget, to build a corps of outstanding teachers in order
19 to improve the quality of instruction at public secondary schools.
20 Such plan for use of funding appropriated herein shall: (i) allocate
21 at least 80 percent of such stipends to high performing teachers in
22 math, science, and related fields and up to 20 percent of such
23 stipends to high performing teachers with an extension to their
24 content area certificate in bilingual education or who hold certifi-
25 cation in English as a Second Language and high-performing teachers
26 with dual certification in a content area and special education;
27 (ii) establish an application process; (iii) guidelines by which
28 applications from eligible teachers shall be evaluated, which shall
29 include, but not be limited to, achievement of a rating of highly
30 effective on the annual professional performance review; and (iv)
31 provide periodic opportunities for professional development for
32 successful applicants. Provided, further, that priority shall be
33 given to applicants in regions of the state where a similar program
34 is not otherwise offered. Notwithstanding any provision of law to
35 the contrary, upon approval of the director of the budget, such
36 \$2,500,000 of master teachers program funding may be suballocated,
37 interchanged, transferred or otherwise made available to the state
38 university of New York for the services and expenses of administer-
39 ing such program. Nothing herein shall be construed to limit the
40 rights of labor organizations representing teachers to collectively
41 bargain terms and conditions pursuant to article 14 of the civil
42 service law.

43 Provided further that, notwithstanding any provision of law to the
44 contrary, the \$1,500,000 appropriated herein available for pathways
45 in technology early college high school (P-TECH) program grants
46 shall be awarded pursuant to a plan developed by the commissioner
47 and approved by the director of the budget, provided that such plan
48 shall include but not be limited to (i) assurances that K-12, higher
49 education and private-sector partners commit to the required
50 elements and responsibilities of a P-TECH program, (ii) provisions
51 to ensure regional diversity of grant recipients, and (iii) priority
52 for P-TECH programs serving students in academically challenged
53 school districts; provided further that the commissioner shall make
54 available the request for proposals for such program on or before
55 May fifteenth and the commissioner shall issue awards on or before
56 August fifteenth; and provided further that a portion of the

8 set a reduced rate of tuition and/or fees, or to waive tuition
9 and/or fees entirely, for students enrolled in such P-TECH program
10 with no reduction in other state, local or other support for such
11 students earning college credit that such higher education partner
12 would otherwise be eligible to receive.

13 Provided, further, that notwithstanding any provision of law to the
14 contrary, the \$1,500,000 appropriated herein available for a school
15 district teacher residency program shall be used to provide resident
16 teachers with the professional development and training to make an
17 immediate impact in schools in the state, pursuant to a plan devel-
18 oped by the commissioner and approved by the director of the budget.
19 Provided, further, that such plan shall establish a process for
20 selection of experienced nonprofit entities to manage the program.

21 Provided, further, that no school district shall receive more than
22 forty percent of the total grant allocation. Provided, further,
23 that notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary,
24 \$1,500,000 of the amount appropriated herein shall be made available
25 for payment of New York state masters-in-education teacher incentive
26 scholarship program awards. Provided, further, that eligibility for
27 an award under this appropriation shall be limited to students who
28 are matriculated in an approved master's degree in education program
29 at a New York state public institution of higher education leading
30 to a career as a teacher in public elementary or secondary education
31 shall be eligible for an award, provided the applicant: (a) earned
32 an undergraduate degree from a college located in New York state;
33 and (b) was a New York State resident while earning such undergradu-
34 ate degree; and (c) achieved academic excellence as an undergraduate
35 student, as defined by the higher education services corporation in
36 regulation; and (d) enrolls in full-time study in an approved
37 master's degree in education program at a New York State public
38 institution of higher education leading to a career as teacher in
39 public elementary or secondary education; and (e) signs a contract
40 with the corporation agreeing to teach in the classroom on a full-
41 time basis for five years in a school located within New York state
42 providing public elementary or secondary education recognized by the
43 board of regents or the university of the state of New York includ-
44 ing charter schools authorized pursuant to article 56 of the educa-
45 tion law; and (f) complies with the applicable provisions of article
46 13 of education law and all requirements promulgated by the corpo-
47 ration for the administration of the program. Provided, further,
48 that: (a) awards shall be granted to applicants that the corporation
49 has certified are eligible to receive such awards; and (b) up to
50 five hundred awards may be made for the 2015-2016 academic year,
51 provided such awards shall be made to recipients after the success-
52 ful completion of the term, as defined by the corporation. Provided,
53 further, the corporation shall grant such awards in an amount equal
54 to the annual tuition charged state resident students attending a
55 graduate program full-time at the state university of New York, or
56 actual tuition charged, whichever is less, for not more than two
57 academic years of full-time graduate study leading to certification
58 as an elementary or secondary classroom teacher; provided: (i) a
59 student who receives educational grants and/or scholarships that
60 cover the student's full cost of attendance shall not be eligible
61 for an award under this program; (ii) for a student who receives
62 educational grants and/or scholarships that cover less than the

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1 student's full cost of attendance, such grants and/or scholarships
2 shall not be deemed duplicative of this program and may be held
3 concurrently with an award under this program, provided that the
4 combined benefits do not exceed the student's full cost of attend-
5 ance; and (iii) an award under this program shall be applied to
6 tuition after the application of all other educational grants and
7 scholarships limited to tuition and shall be reduced in an amount
8 equal to such educational grants and/or scholarships. Provided,
9 further that upon notification of an award under this program, the
10 institution shall defer the amount of tuition equal to the award. No
11 award shall be final until the recipient's successful completion of
12 a term has been certified by the institution. A recipient of an
13 award under this program shall not be eligible for an award under
14 the New York state math and science teaching incentive program.
15 Provided, further that awards granted pursuant to this appropriation
16 shall require a contract between the award recipient and the corpo-
17 ration to authorize the corporation to convert to a student loan the
18 full amount of the award given pursuant to this appropriation, plus
19 interest, according to a schedule to be determined by the corpo-
20 ration if: (a) two years after the completion of the degree program
21 and receipt of initial certification it is found that a recipient is
22 not teaching in a public school located within New York state
23 providing elementary or secondary education recognized by the board
24 of regents or the university of the state of New York including
25 charter schools authorized pursuant to article 56 of the education
26 law; or (b) a recipient has not taught in a public school located
27 within New York state providing elementary or secondary education
28 recognized by the board of regents or the university of the state of
29 New York including charter schools authorized pursuant to article 56
30 of the education law for five of the seven years after the
31 completion of the graduate degree program and receipt of initial
32 certification; or (c) a recipient fails to complete his or her grad-
33 uate degree program in education; or (d) a recipient fails to
34 receive or maintain his or her teaching certificate or license in
35 New York state; or (e) a recipient fails to respond to requests by
36 the corporation for the status of his or her academic or profes-
37 sional progress. Provided, further that the preceding terms and
38 conditions: (a) shall be deferred for any interruption in graduate
39 study or employment as established by the rules and regulations of
40 the corporation; (b) shall be cancelled upon the death of the recip-
41 ient; and (c) notwithstanding any provision of this appropriation to
42 the contrary, authorize the corporation to provide for the waiver or
43 suspension of any financial obligation which would involve extreme
44 hardship pursuant to rules and regulations promulgated by the corpo-
45 ration. Notwithstanding any provision of the law to the contrary,
46 upon approval of the director of the budget, such \$1,500,000 of
47 masters-in-education teacher incentive scholarship program funding
48 may be sub-allocated, interchanged, transferred or otherwise made
49 available to the higher education services corporation for the sole
50 purpose of administering such program.

51 Provided, further, that notwithstanding any provision of law to the
52 contrary, the \$1,500,000 appropriated herein available for QUALITYs-
53 tarsNY shall be used, pursuant to a plan approved by the director of
54 the budget, to support implementation of a statewide system to
55 assess, improve, and communicate the level of quality in early
56 education and care settings throughout the state. Notwithstanding
57 any provision of law to the contrary, upon approval of the director
58 of the budget, the \$1,500,000 of funding appropriated herein for
59 QUALITYstarsNY may be sub-allocated, interchanged, transferred or
60 otherwise made available to the office of children and family
61 services for the sole purpose of administering such system.
62

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1 Provided further that, notwithstanding any provision of law to the
2 contrary, of the amount appropriated herein, a minimum of
3 \$14,000,000 per year shall be available in the 2016-17 through
4 [2019-20] 2020-21 school years for the payment of grant awards as
5 follows: \$11,000,000 for pre-kindergarten grants for three-year-old
6 children, \$1,500,000 for early college high school programs,
7 \$500,000 for career and technical education programs, and \$1,000,000
8 for QUALITYstarsNY; provided, however, the funds appropriated herein
9 for early college high school programs shall only be available for
10 grants awarded for the 2017-18 school year and prior school years;
11 provided, however, the funds appropriated herein for QUALITYstarsNY
12 shall only be available for expenses for the 2018-19 school year and
13 prior school years; provided, however, the funds appropriated herein
14 for career and technical education programs shall only be available
15 for expenses for the 2018-19 school year and prior school years;
16 provided further that, notwithstanding any provision of law to the
17 contrary, such \$14,000,000, plus any other amounts so designated in
18 other items of appropriation within the general fund local assist-
19 ance account office of pre-kindergarten through grade twelve educa-
20 tion program, shall constitute the competitive awards amount author-
21 ized for the 2016-17 school year.

22 Provided further that, notwithstanding any provision of law to the
23 contrary, the \$11,000,000 appropriated herein available for prekin-
24 dergarten grants to full-day and half-day prekindergarten programs
25 for three-year-old children shall be awarded, based on a request for

24 By chapter 53, section 1, of the laws of 2017:
25 For transfer to the credit of the office of children and family
26 services federal health and human services fund, state operations or
27 federal health and human services fund, local assistance, federal

30 of article 6 of the social services law. The funds shall be appor-

56 retroactively to the extent permitted by the federal centers for
57 medicare and medicaid services.

58 In accordance with the medicaid savings allocation plan, the

9 to sections 2807 and 3614 of the public health law, section 18 of
10 chapter 2 of the laws of 1988, and 18 NYCRR 505.14(h).

11 The department of health shall prepare a monthly report that sets
12 forth: (a) known and projected department of health medicaid
13 expenditures as described in subdivision (1) of this section, and
14 factors that could result in medicaid disbursements for the relevant
15 state fiscal year to exceed the projected department of health state
16 funds disbursements in the enacted budget financial plan pursuant to
