AN ACT making appropriations for the support of government

AID TO LOCALITIES BUDGET

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

- 1 Section 1. a) The several amounts specified in this chapter for aid to
2 localities, or so much thereof as shall be sufficient to accomplish the
3 purposes designated by the appropriations, are hereby appropriated and
4 authorized to be paid as hereinafter provided, to the respective public
5 officers and for the several purposes specified.
- 6 b) Where applicable, appropriations made by this chapter for expendi-
7 tures from federal grants for aid to localities may be allocated for
8 spending from federal grants for any grant period beginning, during, or
9 prior to, the state fiscal year beginning on April 1, 2022 except as
10 otherwise noted.
- 11 c) The several amounts named herein, or so much thereof as shall be
12 sufficient to accomplish the purpose designated, being the undisbursed
13 and/or unexpended balances of the prior year's appropriations, are here-
14 by reappropriated from the same funds and made available for the same
15 purposes as the prior year's appropriations, unless herein amended, for
16 the fiscal year beginning April 1, 2022. Certain reappropriations in
17 this chapter are shown using abbreviated text, with three leader dots
18 (an ellipsis) followed by three spaces (...) used to indicate where
19 existing law that is being continued is not shown. However, unless a

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1 change is clearly indicated by the use of brackets [] for deletions and
2 underscores for additions, the purposes, amounts, funding source and all
3 other aspects pertinent to each item of appropriation shall be as last
4 appropriated.

5 For the purpose of complying with the state finance law, the year,
6 chapter and section of the last act reappropriating a former original
7 appropriation or any part thereof is, unless otherwise indicated, chap-
8 ter 53, section 1, of the laws of 2021.

9 d) No moneys appropriated by this chapter shall be available for
10 payment until a certificate of approval has been issued by the director
11 of the budget, who shall file such certificate with the department of
12 audit and control, the chairperson of the senate finance committee and
13 the chairperson of the assembly ways and means committee.

14 e) Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, for purposes
15 of any appropriation made by this chapter which authorizes spending in
16 an amount net of refunds, rebates, reimbursements, credits, repayments,
17 and/or disallowances, "refunds" shall mean funds received to the state
18 resulting from the overpayment of monies, "rebates" shall mean funds
19 received to the state resulting from a return of a full or partial
20 amount previously paid, as for goods or services, serving as a
21 reduction, discount or rebate to the original payment amount,
22 "reimbursements" shall mean funds received to the state as repayment in
23 an equivalent amount for goods or services, including but not limited to
24 personal service costs, incurred by the state in the first instance
25 being provided to a third party for their benefit and partially or in
26 full financed by such third party, "credit" shall mean monies made
27 available to the state that reduce the amount owed to a third party,
28 including but not limited to billing errors, rebates, and prior overpay-
29 ments, "repayment" shall mean the return of monies as pay back for
30 expenses incurred, and "disallowance" shall mean monies made available
31 to the state that were not allowed or accepted officially by the
32 intended recipient, based on a determination the payment is not accepta-
33 ble and/or valid. When the office of the state comptroller receives any
34 such refunds, rebates, reimbursements, credits, repayments, and/or
35 disallowances, he or she shall credit the refunded, rebated, reimbursed,
36 credited, repaid, and disallowed amount back to the original appropri-
37 ation and reduce expenditures in the year which such credit is received
38 regardless of the timing of the initial expenditure.

39 f) Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, if the
40 state or any agency thereof incurs any costs associated with administer-
41 ing the rent regulation program in accordance with subdivision (c) of
42 section 8 of chapter 576 of the laws of 1974, as amended, for a city
43 having a population of one million or more, the director of the budget
44 may direct any other state agency or agencies making payments to such
45 city, or any department, agency, or instrumentality thereof, to perma-
46 nently reduce the amount of any other payment or payments owed to such
47 city or any department, agency, or instrumentality thereof pursuant to
48 any appropriation set forth in this chapter. Provided however, that such
49 reduction shall be in an amount equal to the costs incurred by the state
50 or agency thereof in accordance with subdivision (c) of section 8 of
51 chapter 576 of the laws of 1974 and provided further that such direction
52 shall be made in writing by the director of the budget. If the director
53 of the budget makes such direction pursuant to the authority set forth
54 herein, the impacted city shall not make the payments required by subdi-
55 vision (c) of section 8 of chapter 576 of the laws of 1974, as amended,
56 and the division of housing and community renewal shall notify such city



1 in writing of what payment or payments will be reduced and the amount of
2 such reduction. To the extent a city of one million or more or any
3 department, agency, or instrumentality thereof is entitled to any cash
4 disbursement authorized by any appropriation contained in this chapter,
5 such entitlement shall be reduced commensurate with reductions in
6 payments made in accordance with this part.

7 g) Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, upon enact-
8 ment of this chapter of the laws of 2022 containing the aid to locali-
9 ties budget bill for the state fiscal year 2022-2023, all appropriations
10 and reappropriations contained in chapter 53 of the laws of 2021, which
11 would otherwise lapse by operation of law on March 31, 2023 are hereby
12 repealed.

13 h) The appropriations contained in this chapter shall be available for
14 the fiscal year beginning on April 1, 2022 except as otherwise noted.

44 section 214 of the elder law, except for
45 base year expenditures. To the extent that
46 funds hereby appropriated are sufficient

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1 to exceed the per capita limit established
 2 in section 214 of the elder law, the
 3 excess funds shall be available to supple-
 4 ment the existing per capita level in a
 5 uniform manner consistent with statutory
 6 allocations.

7 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision
 8 of law except pursuant to a chapter of the
 9 laws of 2022 authorizing a 5.4 percent
 10 cost of living adjustment, for the period
 11 commencing on April 1, 2022 and ending
 12 March 31, 2023 the director shall not
 13 apply any other cost of living adjustment
 14 for the purpose of establishing rates of
 15 payments, contracts or any other form of
 16 reimbursement (10318) 33,617,000

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1 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision

6 approval of the director of the budget, up
7 to \$2,000,000 of the amount appropriated
8 herein, may be transferred to state oper-
9 ations for the administration of programs.

10 No expenditures shall be made from this
11 appropriation until the director of the
12 budget has approved a plan submitted by
13 the office outlining the amounts and
14 purposes of such expenditures and the
15 allocation of funds among the counties,
16 including the city of New York.

19 budget, funds appropriated herein for the community services for the
20 elderly program (CSE) and the expanded in-home services for the
21 elderly program (EISEP) may be used in accordance with a waiver or
22 reduction in county maintenance of effort requirements established
23 pursuant to section 214 of the elder law, except for base year
24 expenditures. To the extent that funds hereby appropriated are
25 sufficient to exceed the per capita limit established in section 214
26 of the elder law, the excess funds shall be available to supplement
27 the existing per capita level in a uniform manner consistent with
28 statutory allocations.

29 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of law except a chapter of
30 the laws of 2021 authorizing a 1 percent cost of living adjustment
31 increase, but including section 1 of part C of chapter 57 of the
32 laws of 2006, as amended by section 1 of part I of chapter 60 of the

6 entered foster care, the date the eligi-
7 bility or payment errors occurred, or the
8 filing date of any federal claims for
9 reimbursement; provided, however, that the
10 state shall be responsible for the disal-
11 lowed costs and expenditures related to
12 the placement of children in a facility
13 operated by the office of children and
14 family services, which shall be determined
15 in the same manner as the disallowed costs
16 and expenditures for social services
17 districts other than the city of New York.
18 In order to reimburse the federal govern-
19 ment for the full amount of any disallow-
20 ance imposed on the state by the federal
21 administration for children and families
22 within the timeframes necessary to avoid
23 any potential interest payments on such
24 amount, the office of children and family

30 housing is available; provided, however, that funds appropriated
31 herein may only be used for such purposes if the cost of such allow-
32 ances are not eligible for reimbursement under medical assistance or

34 For persons living with medically diagnosed HIV infection as defined
35 by the AIDS institute of the state department of health who are
36 receiving public assistance funds appropriated herein shall not be
37 used to reimburse the additional rental costs determined based on

40 Amounts appropriated herein may be used to enter into contracts with
41 persons or entities authorized pursuant to subdivision (i) of

32 the office of temporary and disability assistance.

33 Notwithstanding section 153 of the social services law, or any other
34 inconsistent provision of law, such appropriation shall be available
35 for reimbursement of eligible claims incurred on or after January 1,
36 2019 and before January 1, 2020, that are otherwise reimbursable by
37 the state on or after April 1, 2019, that are claimed by March 1,
38 2020. Such reimbursement shall constitute total federal reimburse-
39 ment for activities funded herein in state fiscal year 2019-20

41 For transfer to the credit of the office of children and family
42 services federal health and human services fund, state operations or
43 federal health and human services fund, local assistance, federal
44 day care account for additional reimbursement to social services
45 districts for child care assistance provided pursuant to title 5-C
46 of article 6 of the social services law. The funds shall be appor-
47 tioned among the social services districts by the office according
48 to an allocation plan developed by the office and submitted to the
49 director of the budget for approval within 60 days of enactment of
50 the budget. The funds allocated to a district under this appropri-
51 ation in addition to any state block grant funds allocated to the

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1 district for child care services and any funds the district requests
2 the office of temporary and disability assistance to transfer from
3 the district's flexible fund for family services allocation to the
4 federal day care account shall constitute the district's entire
5 block grant allocation for a particular federal fiscal year, which

 46 which the applicable state agency has a contractual relationship.
 47 Such funds may be suballocated, transferred or otherwise made avail-
 48 able to the department of transportation or to other state agencies,

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1 The following remaining appropriations within the office of temporary
2 and disability assistance federal health and human services fund
3 temporary assistance for needy families account shall be available
4 for payment of aid heretofore accrued or hereafter to accrue to

6 such funds may be increased or decreased by interchange with any
7 other appropriation within the office of temporary and disability
8 assistance or office of children and family services federal fund -
9 local assistance account with the approval of the director of the
10 budget. Such funds shall be provided without state or local partic-
11 ipation for services to eligible individuals under the state plan
12 for the temporary assistance for needy families block grant whose

19 Nothing in this paragraph shall be deemed to

25 In accordance with the medicaid savings
26 allocation adjustment, the commissioner of

29 spending by the amount of the projected
30 overspending through, actions including,
31 but not limited to modifying or suspending
32 reimbursement methods, including but not
33 limited to all fees, premium levels and
34 rates of payment, notwithstanding any
35 provision of law that sets a specific
36 amount or methodology for any such
37 payments or rates of payment; modifying or
38 discontinuing medicaid program benefits;
39 seeking all necessary federal approvals,
40 including, but not limited to waivers,
41 waiver amendments; and suspending time
42 frames for notice, approval or certifi-
43 cation of rate requirements, notwith-
44 standing any provision of law, rule or
45 regulation to the contrary, including but
46 not limited to sections 2807 and 3614 of
47 the public health law, section 18 of chap-
48 ter 2 of the laws of 1988, and 18 NYCRR
49 505.14(h).

50 The department of health shall prepare a
51 quarterly report that sets forth: (a)
52 known and projected department of health

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1 medicaid expenditures as described in
2 subdivision (1) of this section, and
3 factors that could result in medicaid
4 disbursements for the relevant state
5 fiscal year to exceed the projected
6 department of health state funds disburse-
7 ments in the enacted budget financial plan
8 pursuant to subdivision 3 of section 23 of
9 the state finance law, including spending
10 increases or decreases due to: enrollment
11 fluctuations, rate changes, utilization
12 changes, MRT investments, and shift of
13 beneficiaries to managed care; and vari-
14 ations in offline medicaid payments; and
15 (b) the actions taken to implement any
16 medicaid savings allocation adjustment
17 implemented pursuant to subdivision (4) of
18 this section, including information
19 concerning the impact of such actions on
20 each category of service and each
21 geographic region of the state. Each such
22 quarterly report shall be provided to the
23 chairs of the senate finance and the
24 assembly ways and means committees and
25 shall be posted on the department of
26 health's website in a timely manner.

27 The money hereby appropriated is to be
28 available for payment of aid heretofore
29 accrued or hereafter accrued to munici-
30 palities, and to providers of medical
31 services pursuant to section 367-b of the
32 social services law, and for payment of
33 state aid to municipalities and to provid-
34 ers of family care where payment systems
35 through the fiscal intermediaries are not
36 operational.

37 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision
38 of law to the contrary, funds may be used

8 services districts each month as their
9 share of payments made pursuant to section

11 set aside by the state comptroller in an
12 interest-bearing account in order to
13 ensure the orderly and prompt payment of

31 these appropriations may be required to
32 submit written certification, in such form
33 and at such time the commissioner may

39 necessary by the commissioner. The amounts
40 appropriated herein may include advances
41 to organizations authorized to receive

46 transfer, with any appropriation of the
47 department of health and the office of
48 medicaid inspector general and may be
49 increased or decreased by transfer or
50 suballocation between these appropriated
51 amounts and appropriations of the depart-

2 with developmental disabilities, the
3 office of addiction services and supports,
4 the department of family assistance office
5 of temporary and disability assistance,
