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


- In 2012, New York State's Gross State Product (GSP) was \$1.2 trillion. The State ranked third behind California and Texas.


- With nonfarm employment of 8.9 million, New York State ranked third in total nonfarm employment in 2013, behind California and Texas.
- New York State nonfarm employment growth was 1.3 percent in 2013, ranked 26<sup>th</sup> among all states.


Total Nonfarm Employment Growth






- In 2013, New York State per capita personal income was \$54,063 and was ranked seventh among the nation.




- New York State's population in 2013 was 19.7 million, the third largest among the states. The State accounts for 6.2 percent of United States' population.

- New York State has comparatively more young adults than the U.S. as a whole.












High School Completion Rate








Comparing Select Northeast Cities

# Comparing Select Northeast Cities Percentage of Population with a Bachelor's Degree 2010-2012






