Dear Neighbor,

As I continue to work in Albany, fighting for laws that will make New York an even better place to live, I want to take the opportunity to bring you up to date on how I am serving you in the 13th Assembly District.

As President of the New York Chapter of the National Association of Jewish Legislators (NAJL) and a member of its national board of directors, I will continue to defend Israel's right to peaceably exist and condemn those who have attacked our democratic ally. I am also deeply disturbed by the rise in antisemitism right here at home. I also believe we must fight hate against anyone based on their religion, race, sexual orientation, or gender identity.

As Chair of the Judiciary Committee, it is my responsibility to ensure the court system operates in a fair, efficient, and secure manner. With that in mind I have given my support for increased funding for the family court system. This will lead to expanding parent and child representation, adding more family court judges, increasing assigned counsel pay rates, and securing supervised visitation throughout the state. I responded to an increase in threats to judges and court employees by sponsoring the Judicial Security Act (A.5048A) which passed without a dissenting vote in the Assembly and eventually became part of the budget. This legislation safeguards federal, state, and local court officials and their immediate families by permitting them to enroll in the New York State Address Confidentiality Program. Finally, to maximize the efficiency of courts, I sponsored a bill (A.01786) that would eliminate the mandatory retirement age for certain judges. This legislation is intended to utilize the knowledge of aging jurists and to help alleviate the court system's backlog that has increased across courts in New York State since the start of the pandemic.

With the current makeup of the U.S. Supreme Court no longer guaranteeing women can control their own bodies, I continue the fight to protect abortion rights. The New York Santoro Provider Protection Act (A.6904) provides protection for women seeking abortions and related medical services, whether or not they reside in the state. In addition, it aims to prevent harms from unsafe and unregulated abortions and to mitigate the disproportionate impact of abortion bans on indigent women and women of color. A key component of the legislation is funding for those who are low-income and who may need to travel across one or more states to receive access to care.


Among our responsibilities as legislators is to modernize antiquated laws. You may not realize it, but the act of committing adultery is illegal in New York State. I believe the state has no business regulating consensual sexual behavior between adults. With that in mind I introduced a bill (A.4714) to repeal and decriminalize the act of adultery in the state of New York. The bill passed by overwhelming margins in the Assembly and Senate and is now waiting to be signed by the governor.




Supporting Our Schools


