
Colton's Cleanups Inspire

Access-A-Ride Victories

Assemblyman Colton fought for and won full restoration of Access-A-Ride services for two disabled women in Bensonhurst. Assemblyman Colton and his staff pushed on and did not give up on these cases, even after the MTA rejected an appeal in one case.

Fighting Internet Fraud

According to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), Internet fraud robs consumers of over half-a-billion dollars per year. Assemblyman Colton helped a constituent recover \$2,299 taken from his bank account when his debit card information was stolen online. Colton encourages you to call or visit his community office if you think you've been targeted in any fraudulent scheme.

School Transfer for Bullied Youth

When one wheelchair-bound youth was faced with constant bullying and harassment at a local high school, Assemblyman Colton stood up for him and got him transferred to a more accommodating one. Not only did the student's new school have the appropriate staff to assist him, the school specialized in the arts, which is exactly what the youth specializes in.

"All students should be provided a safe learning environment, especially those with special needs. I will continue to stand up for the rights of our children to attend bully-free schools, and I will fight at the state level to pass common sense solutions to combat bullying in our schools," said Colton.

Colton Offers Reduced-Fare MetroCards

MetroCard Mobile Sales Staff will assist those who are eligible every month at Assemblyman Colton's community office:

Seniors 65+

Senior citizens 65 years of age and older can apply for an MTA Reduced-Fare MetroCard and can receive a temporary card the same day. Proper proof of age, such as a Medicare Card, is required.

Seniors with Disabilities

People with qualifying disabilities with a Medicare card and a valid photo I.D., such as a driver's license, can apply for a Reduced-Fare MetroCard and receive a temporary card the same day.

People with Disabilities

People with qualifying disabilities without a Medicare card can also apply. No temporary card will be issued and the applicant must first meet all qualifying criteria. Please note that the application processing may take up to 8 weeks.

Fighting for Safer Streets

Assemblyman Colton continues to work with the Department of Transportation (DOT) to correct concerns raised by residents. Colton has been successful in getting many needed improvements to our streets and sidewalks, making our daily travels much safer. Here are a few of such improvements:

Road Repairs

- Ave. P between McDonald Ave. and E. 4th St.
- Quentin Rd. between E. 2nd and E. 3rd St.
- Dahill Rd. at Ave. P
- In the vicinity of 1583 W. 5th St.
- Cropsey Ave. and Bay 50th near Belt Parkway (154'x 54') repair
- Cropsey Ave. between Bay 44th and 27th Ave.
- 26th and 27th Ave. from 86th St. to Cropsey Ave.
- Speed bump on Lake St. between Ave. S. and Kings Highway
- Tree pruning near 2253 79th St. and 309 Ave. P., removing obstructed view and street lighting

Traffic Light Replacement/Additions

- Countdown signal at Cropsey and 24th Ave.
- Countdown signal at 65th St. and Bay Parkway
- Traffic lights along Benson Ave.
- Traffic light at Ave. O and E. 3rd St.
- Repaired street light at 2633 63rd St.

Sign Replacement/Additions

- No Parking sign at 2475 W. 16th St.
- No Standing sign at Bay 50 St. and W. 16th St. to increase visibility
- No Standing sign at Ave. P and W. 13th St.
- Replacement of signs along Kings Highway and Van Sicklen St., including Ave. S and Van Sicklen St.
