

Successfully Stopping Building of Homeless Shelter

Assemblyman Colton mobilized the community, organized rallies and collected thousands of petition signatures to successfully stop the building of a proposed Homeless Shelter at Bath Avenue and Bay 29 Street. He is currently continuing to fight two other proposed shelters, at 137 Kings Highway and 2501 86th Street.



Making Public Safety a Priority

Assemblyman Colton has been leading the community to support our police. Despite rising crime in many parts of NYC, NYPD CompStat Unit reports that crime has been going down here in 62 Pct. Colton continues to fight for fully funding our police and getting more police on our subways.

Getting Needed Street Improvements

Assemblyman Colton has been calling upon the NYC Department of Transportation to review dangerous streets and as a result traffic lights and signals have been installed and many streets repaved. After constituents contact the Assemblyman about the need for improvements, he fights to get those concerns addressed.

- New traffic lights and pedestrian devices at Bay 10 and 86 Streets
- New traffic light at Bath Avenue and Bay 26 Street

- Streetlamps repaired at West 7 Street between Avenue O and P
- New traffic light to be installed at Bay 37 Street and Bath Avenue by end of year and many others

Organizing Neighborhood Clean-Ups

The most recent clean-up was organized by the Assemblyman on September 30, covering parts of 86 Street, Benson Avenue, 14th Avenue, 18th Avenue and Seth Low Park. Volunteers were mobilized from Brooklyn Tech, Fort Hamilton, John Dewey, Girl Scout Troop 925, Boy Scout Troop 99, as well as the Federation of Italian American Organizations and the Chinese American Social Service Center, with tools provided by the Department of Sanitation. Such clean-ups have been organized often by the Assemblyman for over 12 years, allowing volunteers to contribute to the local neighborhood, as well as clean it.
