When excessive flooding led to dangerous conditions in Midwood and Borough Park, Assemblyman Eichenstein joined forces with Senator Simcha Felder and Councilman Kalman Yeger demanding immediate repair of drainage throughout the district. An urgent letter was sent to the New York City Department of Environmental Protection and the Department of Transportation stating that the flooding poses a significant safety hazard to our communities.

Just two weeks later, the issue was resolved! A team of workers from the Department of Transportation installed proper drainage systems. The streets are now much easier to navigate, no matter what the weather is. Thank you to the leadership of the Department of Transportation for the quick response!

Drivers License Can No Longer Be Suspended Due to Unpaid Fines

New York State drivers will no longer have to worry about suspended licenses due to unpaid traffic tickets and fines. New legislation introduced by Assemblywoman Pamela Hunter and cosponsored by Assemblyman Eichenstein was signed into law by the Governor and will end traffic debt license suspension. Instead, an affordable payment plan would be available to drivers to ensure that their obligations are met. "Drivers no longer need to waste time with needless court appearances," said Assemblyman Simcha Eichenstein. "This new legislation represents a victory for all New York drivers."

Here are some of the highlights and achievements that we have been fighting for that are included in the new budget:

Budget Highlight	How does this impact you?
Transportation Reimbursement to Private Schools	Private schools will be reimbursed for transportation expenses incurred during the pandemic lockdown. This allows parents to continue receiving free transportation for their children to and from school.
Free Private School Busing Expanded	Hundreds of families have recently moved to Staten Island but continue to send their children to non-public schools in Brooklyn. They will now be eligible for free school transportation. This additional service for Staten Island residents expands Senator Felder's historic school busing bill.
Increase in TAP (Tuition Assistance Program)	TAP helps New Yorkers pay tuition at approved schools. These educational grants have been increased by \$500 and now provide up to \$5,665 in tuition funding.
\$1 Billion in Grants and Tax Credits for Small Businesses	Small businesses that lost revenue due to the pandemic can apply for grants directly from NYS. Eligible small businesses are those who are unable to receive federal grants.
\$2.3 Billion for Rent Relief to Tenants and Landlords	This includes 12 months of back rent and utilities and three prospective months of rent assistance for tenants experiencing financial hardships. Tenants AND landlords may apply.
Middle Class Tax Cuts	Lower income tax rates for single filers who earn between \$21,400 and \$215,400, and joint filers who earn between \$43,000 and \$323,300
\$2.5 Billion Increase in Child Care Funding	 \$2.4 billion in child care programming. \$105 million expansion of full-day Pre-K programs, including at private school.
\$85 Million Towards Food Banks and Food Distribution Programs	 \$50 million for Nourish New York \$35 million for Hunger Prevention and Nutrition Assistance Program
\$40 Million in Safety and Security Grants for Nonpublic Schools and Nonprofits	To keep you and your family safe, New York is offering grants designed to boost safety and security at non-public schools, day care centers, and other non-profit institutions which are at risk of being targeted by hate crimes.
\$450 Million in Additional Funding for HEAP	HEAP (Home Energy Assistance Program) helps low-income NYers heat their homes. This year, \$450 million in additional funding has been allocated for HEAP, bringing the total to \$950 million.
Improving Maternal and Post-partum Health	Extends Medicaid coverage for pregnant women from 60 days after pregnancy to one year

Speed Bumps Have Returned to 21st Avenue!

When repaying the length of 21st Avenue last year, the NYC Department of Transportation removed speed bumps that had been in place for many years. This caused hazardous conditions for pedestrians and motorists as speeding cars became a common occurrence.

Upon receiving countless complaints from neighbors residing off 21st Avenue, Assemblyman Eichenstein teamed up with City Councilman Kalman Yeger to pressure DOT to reinstall speed bumps immediately, for the sake of the community's safety.



Silence is Not an Option After Anti-Semitic Incidents on Airline Flights

In a series of anti-Semitic incidents on domestic flights, Jewish passengers were forced to deplane despite the fact that they were complying with mask policies.

Assemblyman Eichenstein joined forces with colleagues in both houses of the Legislature in expressing alarm over these incidents. In a letter to the Federal Aviation Administration and the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey, the elected officials demanded an immediate and prompt investigation.



Assemblyman Simcha Eichenstein to Small Businesses: Apply NOW for Recovery Grant Program

Small businesses that struggled through the pandemic can now apply for up to \$50K in grants through the Small Business Recovery Grant program included in the budget passed by the State Legislature. "This grant can help small business owners stay afloat during these difficult and challenging times," said Assemblyman Simcha Eichenstein. Assemblyman Simcha Eichenstein Urges **Eligible Tenants and Landlords to Apply for the Emergency Rental Assistance Program**



COVID-19 RELIEF: Emergency **Rental Assistance Program (ERAP)**

The Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ERAP), passed as part of this year's state budget, eligible New Yorkers can now apply to help pay rent and utility costs. ERAP benefits are paid directly to the tenant's landlord or property owner or utility.

ELIGIBLE HOUSEHOLDS MAY RECEIVE:

- up to 12 months of rental arrears payments for rent accrued on or after March 13, 2020
- up to 3 months of additional rental assistance if the household spends 30% or more of their monthly income on rent
- up to 12 months of electric or gas utility arrears payments for arrears accrued on or after March 13, 2020

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS:

- Household gross income is at or below 80% of the area median income (AMI)
- A member of the household received unemployment benefits or experienced a reduction in income, incurred significant costs or experienced a financial hardship due to COVID-19 on or after March 13, 2020
- Household is at risk of experiencing homelessness or housing instability, which can be demonstrated by having rental arrears owed on or after March 13, 2020
- For the first 30 days of the program, priority will be given to households with the greatest need
- Both landlords and renters can apply and relief funds are sent directly to the landlord

Note: Residents of Rochester, Monroe County, Yonkers, Onondaga County, Hempstead, Islip and Oyster Bay must apply for relief through local emergency rental assistance programs.

Assemblymembers Simcha Eichenstein and Helene Weinstein Secure Funding for Private School Busing During Covid Lockdowns

Due to the pandemic, local school districts ceased providing funding to nonpublic schools for student transportation expenses, causing private schools to be responsible for shouldering these significant costs. Assemblyman Eichenstein and Assemblywoman Weinstein worked together and succeeded to secure a budget allocation that would reimburse private schools for up to \$17 million in transportation expenses. This provision of funding for busing during the pandemic is a welcome reprieve from the financial crisis that schools have been experiencing.
