

# **Masks and Distribution**



Assembly Member Barron's office has equipped the people in our community with the tools to protect themselves from COVID-19. In partnership with Council Member Inez Barron's office, we have been able to distribute over 200,000 masks and hundreds of gallons of hand sanitizer throughout the community. We have distributed to NYCHA developments, private developments, daycares, community gardens, homeowners associations, nursing homes, churches, and cultural institutions. Our most recent initiative has been to distribute personal protective equipment (PPE) to food pantries. If you or someone you know is in need of a food pantry, you can call 311 or go to foodhelp.nyc. We look forward to continuing to bring the people these tools to help them protect themselves from COVID-19. ### New Yorkers Should Limit Activities

The number of new COVID-19 cases in NYC remains high.

All New Yorkers should take steps to prevent COVID-19. People with underlying health conditions, as well as those who live with or care for them, should take special precautions:

- Avoid public spaces and gatherings.
- When leaving home for work, school, or essential activities, including medical care, COVID-19 testing, vaccination, or to go to the grocery store, or pharmacy, be sure that you are well protected with a mask and hand sanitizer and make sure to practice social distancing.
- · If you feel sick, do not leave home except for a COVID-19 test or other essential medical care.

This advisory applies to a wide range of New Yorkers, such as people 65 and older with certain underlying health conditions, such as heart conditions, chronic kidney disease, Type 2 diabetes, and obesity. It also applies to those who live with or care for these people.

### New Variants/Strains

People in NYC have tested positive for two variants of concern of the virus that causes COVID-19. These variants are more transmissible than other variants and may cause more severe illness.

NYC will continue monitoring for strains, types of variants that show meaningful differences in how they function, and other variants that have been identified and reported in New York State.

### **Updated Face Covering Guidance**

You can get better protection by wearing two masks (a cloth mask over a disposable mask), which improves the fit and adds layers. If you are at higher risk for severe illness from COVID-19, consider using a single highergrade mask, such as a KN95.

### Vaccine Eligibility

The COVID-19 vaccine is currently being distributed to various groups of people who are at increased risk of COVID-19 exposure or severe illness. The vaccine is expected to be widely available to all New Yorkers by mid-2021. There are three COVID-19 vaccines that have been authorized for emergency use.

New York State determines when new groups become eligible for the vaccine, and their schedule may change.


Those currently eligible to receive the vaccine include:

- New York residents ages 16 and up
- Group living facility residents and staff
- Building service workers
- Food industry workers including those that work in grocery stores and restaurants
- Government and not-for-profit workers
- Healthcare workers
- Hotel workers
- Public transit and TLC workers
- School staff: Pre-K college (includes childcare and early intervention staff)

# Barron's Budget Highlights

- Assembly Member Barron advocated for and helped to secure an allocation of \$1.4 Billion each of the next 3 years for the payment of the Campaign for Fiscal Equity debt owed to schools in Black and Brown neighborhoods due to racial discrimination during state budget allocations.
- Assembly Member Barron secured \$20 Million for the Martin Luther King Scholarship Fund for SUNY and CUNY students' non-tuition costs, i.e., books, childcare, transportation, food, etc.
- Assembly Member Barron advocated for and helped to secure a raise in the maximum award for the Tuition Assistance Program Award (TAP) by \$500 for SUNY and CUNY students.
- Assembly Member Barron helped to secure \$3 Billion for rent and mortgage assistance programs.
- Although \$200 Million was secured for capital money for NYCHA developments, Assembly Member Barron continues to fight for billions of dollars in order to secure and or repair boilers, roofs, mold work, as well as general maintenance and repairs.

### **Education**

On March 22, high school buildings reopened for in-person learning for the first time since November 2020.

All remote families will now have one more opportunity to transition to blended learning this school year. This means that if your child is currently learning remotely every day, they will be able to opt in to learning in person in the school building at least part of the week for the remainder of the school year. The Department of Education (DOE) will make every effort to provide as many days of in-person learning as possible.

# When and How to Opt-In to Blended Learning

- Beginning Wednesday, March 24, you can visit the Learning Preference Survey at nycenet.edu/surveys/learningpreference to select blended learning for your child.
- Families can also call 311.

# When Your Student Can Return to the School Building

- Students in district 3-K, Pre-K, and grades K-5, including students in District 75, who opt in to blended learning during this opt-in window will return to buildings in April.
- Students in grades 6-12 who opt into blended learning during this opt-in window, will return at a later date and we will communicate more details as soon as possible.

# Requirements for Returning to the School Building

Please note that if you select blended learning for your child, you must submit the consent form for random COVID-19 testing by the first day your child begins in-person learning. You can submit your consent for testing one of two ways:

• Through your New York City Schools Account https://mystudent.nyc/ under 'Manage Account,' or

Complete and sign the consent form available at https://www.schools.nyc.gov/school-year-20-21/return-to-school-2020/health-and-safety/covid-19-testing and bring it to your child's school on the first day they are back in the school building.

Families that select blended learning are expected to have their child attend in person on days they are scheduled to do so. Please note that if your child is currently learning fully remotely and you do not complete the survey indicating a preference for blended learning, your student will remain fully remote.

The DOE is able to offer this additional chance for fully remote students to opt in to learning in buildings because the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has updated its guidance, allowing the DOE to safely accommodate more students in a classroom.

### **New School Opening**

The East New York Family Academy is a brand new \$111 Million school that Assembly Member Charles Barron and Council Member Inez Barron advocated for on behalf of students who were previously being taught in trailers. The new school will open in the Fall of 2021 and be located at 2057 Linden Boulevard.



## Starrett City/Spring Creek Towers Rent Hike Stopped


The owners of Starrett City/Spring Creek Towers were recently poised to raise rent on approximately 1,800 non-Section 8 units in their development. A call was abruptly placed to Juan Bravo, Community Liaison for Assembly Member Barron, to inform the office that they had submitted their rent increase request to the Department of Homes and Community Renewal (DHCR) and that it would very likely be approved. The State Assembly office immediately sprang into action and after an in-depth conference call with Assembly Member Charles Barron, Council Member Inez Barron, the Commissioner of DHCR RuthAnne Visnauskas, Vincent Riggins of the Concerned Families of Spring Creek Towers, and the owners of Starrett City/Spring Creek Towers, the electeds were able to stop the rent increase by getting the owners to withdraw the application. Shortly after the conference call, a press conference was held in front of the management office for Starrett City/Spring Creek Towers where the Barrons,



along with Vincent Riggins of the Concerned Families of Spring Creek Towers, informed residents that the Barrons got the owners to withdraw the rent increase request and the commissioner to agree with that. Vincent Riggings and the Concerned Families of Spring Creek Towers held a town hall meeting to urge residents to stay vigilant because the owners can resubmit the application for a rent increase at any point in the future. Instead of a rent increase, the owners should be offering more economic assistance and consideration to their residents who are continuing to suffer under the pandemic.

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# Parks

Our ancestors were buried on the land previously known as "Schenck Park," named after a former slaveholder. The park was renamed Sankofa Park. The streets surrounding the park were co-named African Burial Ground square. A tremendous cultural ceremony and re-internment of our ancestors, remains, took place Thursday, July 18, 2019. Sankofa is a Swahili word meaning looking back to go forward. The renovation process will start this year and is expected to be completed by 2022.
