

Why am I telling you this?

What does that mean?

■ If a state records an increase in the number of people who call it home, the more congressional representatives that state receives. The more representatives it receives, the more funding they receive.

What does that funding cover? Well, let's look.

HOUSING

- Completing the Census allows for a greater apportionment of federal dollars for affordable housing programs to help combat homelessness.
- Housing for the aging, Housing for veterans, Housing for economically distressed communities, Housing for immigrant populations. The ability for states and municipalities to invest in first time home buyer programs.

CRIME

- The Census allows for more funding that can be used for better recruitment, training, and education for police departments.
- More funding can also be used for Civilian Complaint Review Boards and Department Inspector Generals to have greater flexibility in reviewing claims of abuse by officers.

UNEMPLOYMENT

■ Funding from the Census allows states to attract companies to their state. It can provide aid to small entrepreneurs to start up & hire within their community, and support Business Improvement Districts (BIDs) to revitalize economically distressed areas.

EDUCATION

- The Census can help schools in closing the tech divide.
- Schools can hire better teachers, and social workers.
- Funding can return after school programs such as STEM, arts, sports, and college prep.
- It can also expand the number of pre-k programs.

HIGHER EDUCATION

- Census funding can be devoted to city and state universities to aid in tuition assistance.
- It can help cover the cost for specialized programs such as medical and dental training.

IMMIGRATION

- Census funding can provide legal assistance, language learning programs, access to health care, education, and small business opportunities.
- These are just a few of the opportunities presented by the Census.
- The Census is our way of securing what so many before us rightfully fought for. Let us honor their struggle in this New Civil Rights Movement by claiming what is ours.
