Only have a minute to spare? Here's what you need to know:

- The Governor added another of my initiatives to her budget proposal.
 Governor Hochul also included my bill to eliminate the cap on NY Supreme Court Justices in her initial budget. She recently released amendments, adding a proposal very similar to my bill to regulate the use of Al in campaigns. If implemented, any election in the state would be required to disclose if they use Al to create an ad.
- I was added to a new Committee, the Codes Committee. The Codes
 Committee is one of only two "dual reference" committees (the other is Ways and Means); specifically, any bill dealing with a punishment or penalty must go through Codes even if it went to another committee first. I'm the first freshman to be added to Codes in over a decade. I'm excited to use this new role to keep our district safe.

PASSING LEGISLATION

The Assemblymember passed a bill unanimously (147-0) to standardize and encourage cloud computing in state government.

The idea came from his career in government tech before he was elected. If implemented, it will lead to quicker deployment of new features, more secure data for citizens, and cost savings to government and taxpayers.

FINDINGS FROM BUDGET HEARINGS



In February, the legislature held hearings on the Governor's proposed budget. The Assemblymember participated in five hearings in which he pressed Commissioners and advocates on ways of improving the budget. Some of the lessons include:

- The Office of Court Administration strongly supports the Assemblymember's "No Cap Act."
- The DMV is asking for substantial funding to modernize IT and could have more success if they follow an agile methodology.
- Though expensive, cost of living adjustments for healthcare workers could reduce the staff shortages, leading to long wait times and worse patient outcomes.
- NYC is not getting its fair share of Environmental Bond Act investment, but the procurement office of New York State does not see any reason to hold up the funding.

MICROMOBILITY REGULATION



Alex joined advocates and fellow legislators in Albany to push for proposals to make our streets safer. Included in those proposals were three of Alex's bills:

- 1.A7628: Ensure we have accurate data on e-bike, moped, and other collisions.
- 2.A8052: Require moped dealers register with the DMV.
- 3.A8450: Require all mopeds be registered at the point of sale.

GUIDING AI POLICY

Assemblymember Bores participated in a panel in Albany on the use of Al in education. The other panelists included Chancellor John King, Chairman Steve Otis, Senator Kristen Gonzalez, SUNY professors, and a student from SUNY.



They discussed the role academics and students will have to play in researching AI safety.
