A Tribute Ceremony at Newly Rediscovered Women's Overseas Service League Flagstaff and Grove in Central Park Honors Women Serving America in WWI and Beyond



Assembly Member Seawright, Co-chair of the East Side World War I Centennial Commemoration, American Red Cross, and the NYC Department of Veterans' Services hosted a Tribute Ceremony to the Women Who Have Served America on Wednesday, November 6 at the newly rediscovered Women's Overseas Service League Flagstaff and Grove, Central Park at 69th Street Walk.

In 1925 a Central Park memorial grove of 24 trees and flagstaff were conceptualized as a tribute to American women who died overseas during World War One. Today the living memorial of thriving trees spans the walk along Fifth Avenue from 69th to 71st Streets. In 1932 hundreds of leading New Yorkers gathered on a "smooth green plot set aside by the Parks Department for a ceremony in bugle sounds, song, and words." Today this grove--almost lost to history--is the only memorial in Manhattan to women veterans.

To remember and honor these brave women and others who have served America as veterans and in support roles up and until today, we bring attention to this Flagstaff and Grove in Central Park.

So Comes the Sacred Work: Disabled Soldiers and the Humanitarianism of John Galsworthy during the Great War

John Galsworthy (1867-1933), recipient of the 1932 Nobel Prize for literature, was one of the best-selling authors of the twentieth century. While his name has become synonymous with The Forsyte Saga, the epic sequence of novels and "interludes" about the upper-middleclass Forsyte family, his literary reputation belies his humanitarianism during the Great War supporting British and American soldiers disabled in combat.

This lecture will address the personal and ethical circumstances which motivated Galsworthy to take up what he called "the sacred work," and the relevance of this history to scholarly and popular dialogue about the immediate and future care of soldiers disabled in war.

## **GENDA Goes Into Effect**

Upholding the Rights of Transgender and Gender-Nonconforming Individuals

## **GENDA** IS NOW FULLY IN EFFECT

TRANSGENDER RIGHTS

Transgender and gender-nonconforming individuals waited far too long for their rights to be recognized. Discrimination and bigotry stood in the way of opportunities that should never have been denied. That ended earlier this year with the passage of the Gender Expression Non-Discrimination Act (GENDA) (Ch. 8 of 2019).

GENDA protects the rights of transgender and gender-nonconforming New Yorkers and makes gender identity or expression one of the state's protected classes. No one should ever be denied basic needs like housing and health care or employment opportunities because of another's narrow-mindedness. Today, the provisions of GENDA that make it a hate crime to harm a person based on their gender identity or expression go into effect, providing more protection from discrimination.

As the Supreme Court struggles to decide whether a federal civil rights law protects gay and transgender employees and the federal administration continues to perpetuate intolerance, New York is taking a stand against hate. The Assembly Majority fought for this legislation for more than a decade, and with new Senate leadership this year, we were finally able to make it law and show that here in the Empire State everyone deserves to be treated with fairness and respect.

To that end, we also passed a law this year that bars the 'gay and trans panic' defense, which had allowed a victim's sexual orientation or gender identity to be used as an affirmative defense to reduce a murder charge (Ch. 45 of 2019). This abhorrent defense blames the victim's identity for their tragic death instead of calling the murder what it is – a hate crime.

Our fight against bigotry is far from over, but we won't stand idly by while people are discriminated against for being themselves. GENDA is a victory for all transgender and gender-nonconforming New Yorkers.

## Strengthens background checks

We passed a full slate of commonsense gun safety legislation in 2019. One of these new laws – which went into effect on Nov. 2 – requires out-of-state citizens who also have homes in New York to waive the confidentiality of their home state mental health records when applying for a firearm license in New York (Ch. 242 of 2019). This law makes clear that if you want to own a gun in New York, you must follow the same rules and regulations as New Yorkers.

In the Assembly we continue the fight to protect families from the horrors of gun violence. Earlier this year, we passed laws that create an extreme risk protection order, ban undetectable firearms and bump stocks, require safe storage of guns and ensure thorough background checks (Ch. 19, 134, 130, 135 and 129 of 2019).

"While this is a big step forward, I know that our work is far from finished. I'll continue fighting to advance additional legislation that helps keep guns out of the wrong hands and protects our families from senseless violence," said Assembly Member Rebecca Seawright.

### Update on 90th Street Ferry Landing

Following much delayed construction, the long-awaited path at East 87<sup>th</sup> Street to the Upper East Side ferry landing will be open to the public on Saturday, November 9<sup>th</sup>. This path, along with the path at East 96<sup>th</sup> Street, will be fully ADA-accessible.

On Monday, November 11<sup>th</sup>, the temporary path (with stairs) at East 90<sup>th</sup> Street will close and EDC will work on restoring it to its original condition in the coming weeks.




