The Boss Bill Signed Into Law Keeping **Employee Health Decisions Confidential**



THE BOSS BILL IS NOW LAW

Making sure reproductive health decisions are

NONE OF YOUR BOSS'S BUSINESS

In New York State we recognize that the only people who should be weighing in on reproductive health care decisions are a woman and her doctor. Legislation Seawright cosponsored and helped pass to ensure New Yorkers are free to make these personal decisions without fear of adverse repercussions from their employers was signed into law (Ch. 457 of 2019).

The law, known as the "Boss Bill," prohibits employers from discriminating against employees based on their or their dependents' reproductive health decisions and bars them from accessing private medical information about their employees without the employee's prior informed, written consent.

HEAP is a federally funded program that helps renters and homeowners keep their homes warm by covering the costs of electricity, wood, kerosene, coal, oil, propane, natural gas or other heating fuels. The program also offers funds to eligible families for any repairs and necessary home-heating equipment.

The application for regular HEAP benefits is now open. Eligibility for the program is based on income, household size, primary heating source and whether a member of the household is under the age of 6, over the age of 60 or permanently disabled, with applications for assistance accepted on a first-come, first-served basis. This year, a family of four that has a household income of up to \$4,797 a month may qualify for help and each household can receive up to \$726 in assistance. Applications for an extra emergency benefit open on Jan. 2, 2020, and are available to households that are in danger of having their service shut off or have run out of fuel.

A Message from The Chapin School

Dear Neighbors,

Please be advised that this Saturday, November 16, our contractors must conduct a fuel tank cleaning at the school, and we will also receive a scaffold delivery. The scaffold delivery will come in at our loading dock location from East End Avenue. It will involve some on-site assembly, however, we are told this will be minimally noisy and will not take place near the fuel tank cleaning.

The cleaning will take place during regular work hours (9:00 am - 5:00 pm) and is a single day operation. There will be one truck on site to complete this work, and the truck will be within the shed area for the duration of the work.

The cleaning operation is not noisy work. However, we have been advised that the truck will idle when the pump turns on to recover the oil. In addition, for approximately one hour while fuel is pumped from the tank to the truck, there will be a noticeable diesel smell. We were informed that there will not be a lingering odor once the pumping has concluded, as this process is similar to that of receiving an oil delivery. In an effort to mitigate any possible odor issue, we will have fans present on the scene. For the remainder of the time, the work will involve interior cleaning in our basement.
