Today is National Gun Violence Awareness Day. The gun violence crisis takes 120 lives and wounds hundreds more every day across the nation. Black Americans unduly bear the brunt of gun violence, largely due to systemic inequities and racial discrimination. Firearms are the leading cause of death of children and teens in America.

Our legislation to establish an intersex awareness campaign has passed both houses. Intersex in the "I" in LGBTQIA+. I am proud to have sponsored and obtained passage of this important legislation to help prevent intersex youths from non-consensual surgeries, including sterilization, to make them fit into a binary. This is a great start to Pride month in New York! Another bill passed this week extends the authority of lenders to continue open end loan services.

I spoke at a press conference in support of survivors of sexual abuse and the CARE Act to add clergy to the list of mandated reporters. How we as New Yorkers and lawmakers treat victims of abuse, the youngest and most vulnerable among us, that will define us as a State. Adding clergy members to the list of mandatory reporters of child abuse and maltreatment will ensure prior victims of child sexual abuse are made whole.

Seawright Intersex Education Bill Passed Both Houses Protecting Bodily Autonomy

Assembly Member Rebecca Seawright announced the passage of legislation she sponsored to require the New York State Department of Health to conduct a public information and outreach campaign on medically unnecessary treatments on persons born with intersex traits or variations in sex characteristics.

"Our goal with this legislation is to educate new parents on the unnecessary and often harmful surgeries performed on infants and young children born intersex. Education will be key to helping parents understand that surgery is permanent and can cause irreversible effects," said Assembly Member Rebecca Seawright.

The program established by the bill will include an advisory council including intersex people, intersex-led organizations, and healthcare providers with demonstrated medical expertise treating intersex individuals in a manner that respects their bodily integrity and self-determination.

"We are proud to have been working with impacted communities and InterACT, a nonprofit organization using innovative strategies to advocate for the legal and human rights of children with intersex traits," continued Seawright.

InterACT advocates lauded the passage of the legislation in New York, *"In passing this legislation, New York lawmakers have sent a clear message in support of the visibility and bodily autonomy of intersex people. Young people with variations in their sex development deserve understanding and the chance to make decisions about their own bodies. We are grateful to Assemblymember Seawright and Senator Hoylman for supporting them, and urge Governor Hochul to sign this bill as soon as possible."*

Intersex is an umbrella term for differences in sex traits and/or reproductive anatomy. There are over 30 intersex variations, and intersex traits occur in up to 1.7% of the population. This means being intersex is as common as being born with red hair. Intersex is most importantly about biology, not sexuality or gender. Although some intersex people may identify as LGBTQ+, this is additional to their intersexuality. Many intersex youths around the globe are subjected to non-consensual surgeries, including sterilization, to make them fit into a binary. These irreversible harms include scarring, chronic pain, urinary incontinence, loss of sexual sensation and function, depression, post-traumatic stress disorder, suicidality, and incorrect gender assignment. These surgeries are classified as human rights violations by the UN.



The Assembly majority unanimously approved Seawright's bill to approve a two-year extension on limits lenders can charge for annual fees associated with certain types of credit cards, home-equity loans, and other forms of revolving credit.

Assembly Member Rebecca Seawright Speaks at Press Conference In Support of CARE Act to Add Clergy as Mandated Reporters



Assembly Member Rebecca Seawright joined her colleagues and bill sponsors Assembly Member Monica Wallace, Senator Brad Hoylman, Advocate Joyce Short, abuse survivors, and clergy in support of the Child Abuse Reporting Expansion (CARE) Act.

Survivors of sexual abuse are seeking to amend the current legislation on mandated reporters. CFCtoo was formed in June 2022 when a child sexual abuse case came to light at Christian Fellowship Center in Madrid, NY. CFC pastors' failure to report the abuse for over four years galvanized current and former CFC members to create CFCtoo.

At least 28 other states already designate clergy as mandatory reporters of child abuse. It is time for New York to follow suit. Our state law already requires that teachers, social workers, healthcare workers, law enforcement, and dozens of other professionals report suspected child abuse to the authorities. By adding clergy to the extensive list of mandatory reporters, we will prioritize the protection of children and help ensure that abusers are held accountable.
