I was excited to learn shortly after the publication of my <u>last newsletter</u> that I would once again be serving on the Committees on Correction, Environmental Conservation, Housing, People with Disabilities, Veterans' Affairs and was reappointed as Chair of the Subcommittee on Employment Opportunities for People Disabilities. I also was pleased to be appointed to a sixth committee – the Committee on Banks – and honored to have been named to leadership as Secretary of the Majority Conference.

Meanwhile, the 2023-24 budget process officially kicked off last week with the Governor's budget presentation, discussed below.

Equality Amendment Passes the Legislature, Headed to the Voters

I was very pleased to once again vote in favor of the Equality Amendment, which passed the Legislature for a second consecutive year. It will now go before voters as a ballot referendum in November 2024. This amendment will memorialize in our state constitution protections against discrimination based on an individual's ethnicity, national origin, age, disability, or sex (including sexual orientation, gender identity, and gender expression as well as pregnancy, pregnancy outcomes and reproductive health care decisions). Current constitutional protections include protections against discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion or creed; this expansion advances and reaffirms the state's commitment to protecting all New Yorkers from unjust and prejudicial treatment on the basis of their identity.

Following the U.S. Supreme Court's devastating decision to overturn *Roe v. Wade*, enshrining reproductive rights in our state constitution is paramount. This measure builds on New York's record of protecting people's fundamental right to choose.

The Governor's Budget Proposal & Upcoming Westchester Budget Forums

A state budget should address the needs and values of the people of that state. **My role as Assemblymember is to do my best to ensure that the NYS budget reflects the needs and values of the 93rd Assembly District.** Our state is wonderfully diverse and complex, which at first blush may seem to make the task of fashioning a budget seem impossible. However, while it can be daunting, the process can be successful when all the participants – the Governor, the Legislature, advocates, and constituents – are mindful that this is a process of collaboration and compromise, with limited resources that far outpace our needs.

The process started last week with Governor Hochul's presentation of her budget proposal (and for those of you with particular items of concern, please bear in mind that it is just that - a proposal). The Legislature now begins its role, delving into the myriad details and holding hearings with the Executive, advocates,

and the public (for a schedule of hearings, which will be available to view live on the <u>Assembly</u> and <u>Senate</u> websites, please <u>click here</u>.)

I am fully involved in that work now and wish to share with you some of my initial views - where I agree and find disagreement with the Governor's proposed budget.

Education – I strongly favor the Governor's plan to complete the three-year phased commitment to fully fund Foundation Aid, the major category of aid for NYS public schools. This budget reflects the largest investment in public education in NYS history, which is critical to maintaining the excellence of the public schools while holding down school property taxes. I am concerned, however, about her charter school expansion proposal and the financial impact it will have on the state's public schools.

Mental Health – As with the investment in education, I strongly support the Governor's proposal for \$1 billion to overhaul the state's outdated mental health care system.

Housing – While I commend the Governor for addressing the issue of housing in her budget, I am disappointed with the proposal's top-down mandates, upending local control of zoning and building codes to increase housing stock. It would require every Westchester municipality with an MTA train or bus station to drastically increase density within one-half mile of the station. It also would require every Westchester municipality to increase overall housing by 3% within three years (beginning in 2024), and if that requirement is not met, the municipality is subject to draconian state action enforceable by the Attorney General. As with last year, I am joining many of my colleagues in pushing back, working to replace the penalties with incentives – especially since so many of the local governments in my district have already taken strong and effective measures to promote affordable housing.

The Environment – While I am generally pleased with the budget plan's commitment to the fight against climate change, I also feel it is insufficient. We need a more robust investment – particularly as we access the huge flow of funds that will become available under the federal government's Bipartisan Infrastructure Bill and the \$4.2 billion NYS environmental bond referendum approved in November. Every locality in my district needs substantial funding for local water quality projects and I will be pressing for just that.

Fixing Our Roads and Bridges – Our state and local roads and bridges urgently need work. We have fallen behind. I will press for increased funding levels, particularly for our DOT region, which is underfunded. Continuation at the present levels as proposed by the Governor will not be sufficient. With significant funding under the Bipartisan Infrastructure Bill yet to be received, I advocated last year for a more robust five-year DOT capital plan. I am joining my colleagues this year to press for increased funding for state roads as well as for the Consolidated Highway Improvement Program (CHIPs) for local roads. Similarly, we need higher funding levels for other local infrastructure programs, including Extreme Winter Recovery, Fix our Potholes, and Bridge NY.

Health Care – Health Care is a human right and while I am pleased to see the increased investment, we need to ensure equal access to health care for all, which will require a greater commitment.

Childcare and Pre-K – All children should have access to high-quality pre-K and their families need affordable childcare. I will press for increased funding in both areas. We need to increase childcare access along the lines of last year's Assembly proposal to maintain current subsidies, to expand eligibility from 200 percent of the federal poverty level to 400 percent over a three-year period, and to provide additional funding to expand access and availability. These steps are critical to a solid educational foundation for every child and the ability of their parents/caregivers to earn a living.

People with Disabilities – While the budget provides increased funding in this area, I will press for fair pay for home care workers and for the full 8.5% statutory cost-of-living adjustment for staff and other personnel who support individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

Relief for Pass Due Utility Bills Available

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, unpaid consumer and small-business utility debts piled up for many. Now, 478,000 residential customers and 56,000 small businesses in New York State will receive a total of \$672 million in assistance to help pay off past due utility bills – the largest utility customer financial assistance program in state history.

To qualify for a bill credit in 2023, an individual must have a past due balance for service billed through May 1, 2022 and be a residential customer who did not previously receive an electric or gas bill credit. Small business customers with usage below a certain point for electricity and gas in the past 12 months who have a past due balance for service billed through May 1, 2022 are also eligible.
