Protecting the environment

- \$1.84 billion in funding for the environment, including \$300 million for the New York State Environmental Protection Fund (EPF)
- The budget provides for the \$3 billion "Restore Mother Nature" Environmental Bond Act to be on the ballot in the 2022 general election
- \$500 million to support New York State's clean water infrastructure



Supporting small businesses

- **\$800 million** for small business grants
- \$40 million for the Arts Recovery Grant program
- \$35 million in tax credits for restaurants in areas impacted by enhanced COVID-19 restrictions
- \$25 million for the NY Restaurant Resiliency Grant Program
- \$100 million for a musical and theatrical production credit

Helping people stay in their homes

- Allocates \$2.3 billion in combined federal and state aid to help tenants pay back rent
- Provides \$575 million in mortgage assistance
- Provides \$20 million for the Homeowner Protection Program for foreclosure prevention
- Upstate Civil Legal Services: \$3.5 million in new funding for civil legal services in Buffalo, WNY, and other Upstate regions

Investing in education

- \$29 billion in total education aid, an increase of \$3 billion, to support staff, restore programs and provide more mental health support
- Provides \$105 million more for pre-K programs for a total of \$924 million
- Allocates \$94.2 million for libraries and \$34 million for library construction grants

Supporting workers and affordable child care

- \$50 million for the COVID-19 Recovery Workforce Initiative for workers hardest hit during the pandemic
- \$2.4 billion in federal child care aid to expand subsidy eligibility and reduce copays
- Creates a tax credit for businesses participating in the Excelsior Jobs Program that offer new child care programs to employees

Repairing roads and bridges

- 2021-22 Budget will invest \$11.2 billion in the state's transportation network, including a \$350 million increase in funding for the Department of Transportation's (DOT) two-year capital plan
- \$538.1 million for the Consolidated Highway Improvement Program (CHIPs), an increase of \$100 million
- \$100 million for extreme weather recovery
- \$150 million for Pave NY, a \$50 million increase

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
