Testimony of Cortland County Community Action Program, Inc. Submitted to the New York State Joint Housing Budget Hearing 2/20/2026

Chair Krueger, Chair Pretlow, and Members of the Legislature:

My name is Stacey Henry, and I am the Energy Services Director of Cortland County Community Action Program, Inc. (CAPCO), the Weatherization provider serving all of Cortland and Tompkins counties. We appreciate the opportunity to submit testimony regarding the FY 2027 Housing Budget.

CAPCO strongly supports the joint testimony submitted by NYSWDA, the Association for Energy Affordability, and NYSCAA, the statewide Community Action Association. We write to reinforce the urgent need to **restore and protect funding for the Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) in the Fiscal Year 2027 Budget.**

About the Weatherization Assistance Program

For decades, a majority of Weatherization in New York State has been funded through the consistent federal-state framework in which **10% of Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) funds are allocated to the Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP).** This allocation is not discretionary; it is critical to the State's ability to deliver permanent, energy-related cost savings (and health & safety) measures to the homes of the local low-income families in our community. For our agency, the diversion of these funds represents a **60 percent reduction** in available resources, fundamentally undermines our ability to sustain operations and deliver essential weatherization services and serve the low-income population in both Cortland and Tompkins counties.

What Weatherization Means in Our Community

Weatherization is a federally authorized program that reduces energy costs for low-income households by improving home energy efficiency, ensuring safe heating systems, and addressing health and safety hazards.

Last year, our agency:

- 450 households served in 2025.
- Leveraged \$1,563,340 in federal and state funding
- Employed 10 staff with specialized skillsets and 20 contractors
- Served residents in the districts of Assembly member Anna Kelles and Senator Lea Webb.

- For many of the households we serve, energy costs consume a disproportionate share of income. Weatherization provides permanent bill reduction, improves housing quality, and stabilizes vulnerable families.

The Impact of HEAP Funding Loss

Without the HEAP Funding designated to WAP, our weatherization program will become unsustainable. It will force us to:

- Lay off our highly trained building science professionals
- Disrupt our contractor networks built over decades
- Increase energy burden for our low-income residents
- Greatly reduce the number of families we serve
- Consider ending the essential federally mandated Weatherization Assistance Program services we provide in our dual county area.

This funding represents the majority of our annual operating capacity. Cuts would not be temporary — they would dismantle infrastructure that has taken decades for us to build.

We respectfully urge the Legislature to:

- **Restore and protect the 10 percent HEAP Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) allocation through Social Services Law § 97(5) in the Fiscal Year 2027 Budget.**

Weatherization is one of the most cost-effective housing stabilization tools available. It permanently lowers utility costs, reduces arrears, prevents displacement, and strengthens communities across New York. For our organization, this translates into measurable, lasting affordability improvements for the households we serve—reducing crisis interventions and helping families, people with disabilities, and seniors remain safely in their homes.

We respectfully urge restoration of the 10 percent HEAP weatherization set-aside in the final FY 2026–27 State Budget. Thank you for your consideration and continued leadership on housing stability and affordability.
